





Bardo, General Manager of the Railroad.: "The original electrification of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad on its New York Division virtually was the result of a legislative enactment of May 7, 1903. This required that the Grand Central Terminal and approaches within the limits of the city of New York, should, within approximately five years, be operated with some form of motive power not requiring combustion. As no form of motive power, other than electricity, was feasible, or economical for service, electricity was decided upon". A detailed study with schematic diagrams & plans. 






A "favoured nation" policy, allowing the United States the same rights as French ships going into and out of the ports of France and her colonies. This was the year in which Louis XVI was executed, the Reign of Terror began, the Holy Roman Empire declared war on France, and the United States proclaimed its neutrality. This decree is officially stamped at the end of the final page of text.



While there is a map that is sometimes found with this edition or with the second London edition, this map was in fact issued after the publication of both editions and is often found with the 1760 edition of Douglas' "Summary of the British Settlements in North America" which was also published by



Dodsley. There has been some discussion about whether the work was written by Ellis Huske, who died in 1755, or by his eldest son, John, (1721?-1773). A second edition "with Emendations" was published in London and two editions were published in Boston, all in the same year, but this first edition of Huske's angry denunciation of French policy in America is very rare.








One of the best contemporary accounts of travels to the northern mines of California. Tyson journeyed by way of Panama, and arrived in California on May 18, 1849. He was the first competent professional physician to record for the prospective emigrant information for the preservation of his health both while en route and while in the mines. Kurutz notes that "Tyson's book is important in that it not only describes his adventures, but also includes advice on how to stay healthy for those crossing the Isthmus or working in the mines. He wrote: 'I never saw so many broken-down constitutions as during my brief stay in California." This copy lacks the title-leaf (pp.1-2), but, as Kurutz notes, the wrapper title is the same save for the addition of "The Land of Promise" above the border.






Seven plates have some foxing, otherwise they are clean, clear and bright. Notable for the high degree of contrast found in nineteenth century steel engravings - sets free of foxing have become somewhat difficult to find 900.00

Note: The steel engraved plates were done in 1840-1841 and were still in use as late as 1884. William Withrow's A Popular History of the Dominion of Canada... 2 volumes 1884, had twenty-four Bartlett engraved plates. Given the title page imprint this issue was probably about 1855. There is talk that late plate wear produced weaker images but I have seen no evidence of that. There is no imprint or date on these plates, titles only, another indication of later pulls.

William Henry Bartlett, 1809-1854, a noted traveller and highly skilled landscape artist, visited Canada four times between 1836 and 1852. He provided some twenty travelogues with brief texts. The prose text by Willis relates the history and current conditions in Upper and Lower Canada



about 1839-40". - Canadian Scenery is considered Bartlett's finest production (Sabin). - "A very deep impression upon the pictorial history of Canada was made by William Henry Bartlett, artist and illustrator". Spendlove. Bartlett's original water-colour drawings for Canadian Scenery are in the ROM and are fantastic.


Robert Bell(1841-1917) served in various prominent positions with the Geological Survey of Canada for over 50 years and when the photograph was taken was the Acting Director, a position he held from 1901 to 1906. On the verso of the photograph is a letter signed by Robert Bell (136 McLaren Street, 4th Nov. '07) to Henry Morgan: Dear Dr. Morgan, This is a Cambridge (England) photo which you said you would like to have with my comp'ts. (Signed) R. Bell. Dr. Henry Morgan (1842-1913) was a prominent Canadian civil servant best remembered for his biographical studies.



Apart from these contemporary printings no other accounts of the early exploration of Tasmania were published until 1861 when James Erskine Calder, the Tasmanian Surveyor General, edited many of the reports and had them printed in the Tasmanian Parliamentary Papers." John Douglas Borthwick (1832-1912), author and Anglican clergyman, served in Montreal most of his life and was sometime Protestant chaplain of Montreal prisons. Although earlier on he wrote several reference books, he is remembered as a historian of Montreal and for his many books on the city.



See also Tremaine 1144, citing a broadside printed in York, July 3rd, 1799, which announced the imminent sale of these same lands.

John Small (1746-1831).. came to Canada in 1792 and in 1793 he was appointed clerk of the Executive Council of Upper Canada. This position he held at York, until his death in 1831. cf. D.C.B.

"... Small is best known for the duel on 3 Jan. 1800 in which he mortally wounded John White\*, the attorney general. Mrs Small had publicly snubbed the notoriously quarrelsome Mrs White. White reacted by questioning the legality of Small's marriage and the morals of his wife in a letter to David William Smith\*, which was communicated to Chief Justice John Elmsley\* and received credence in York society. Small insisted upon immediate satisfaction, without determining how much of the gossip had actually come from White. He was acquitted on a charge of murder after a brief trial, despite the hostility of the presiding judge, Henry Allcock\*.

JOHN SMALL, C. E. C.

The affair ruined both Mrs Small's reputation and the connection that Small had formed with the Russells, Macaulays, and Macdonells of Collachie. Peter Russell\*, who at Newark in May 1795 had defended Small against an anonymous libel, was White's friend and executor. When Small sought election to the House of Assembly in July 1800 he was defeated; and in a second attempt at a by-election a year later he was crushed, 112 votes to 32, by Angus Macdonell\* (Collachie). Of his former friends, Joseph Willcocks\* and the elder Robert Baldwin voted for him. On New Year's Day 1806 Elizabeth Russell would still acknowledge him only by "a distant curtsey." Two years later, Mrs Small's invitation to a governor's levee occasioned resentment.

As clerk of the council, Small was paid £100 a year – less than an unskilled labourer and only slightly more than the senior of his two clerks – besides being entitled to about one-fifteenth of land fees. He had inherited property in Gloucestershire which he disposed of some time before the end of 1795. Forbidden in 1797 to collect fees from loyalists and unsuccessful in petitions for a higher stipend, he was able to establish his family by speculating in land at York. One of the first officials to buy a house there, in August 1795, he had accumulated over 2,500 acres before beginning to sell lots in 1797 and he continued to acquire and sell land. By the 1820s the rise in York land prices had made him prosperous.

He also regained a position in York society. 

This act introduces for the first time in Upper Canada, legislation and regulations to govern the licensing of Public Houses for the Sale of Spirituous Liquors to the public. Almost certainly printed by Louis Roy, the first printer of Upper Canada, this is the first Liquor Licensing Act of Upper Canada.

"In 1792 Lt.-Gov. John Graves Simcoe proclaimed West Niagara the capital of Upper Canada and renamed it Newark, since it provided a place for the Loyalists. The name also recalled Newark upon Tent in Norttinghamshire, England... The first five sessions of Upper Canada's Legislature were held here, the last being on 3 June 1796, after which York (now Toronto) was the site of subsequent sessions. Simcoe named Newark Township in 1792 but the residents preferred Niagara and had that name reinstated by law in 1798". Rayburn. Place Names of Ontario p241.

This is a famous work of historical geography, encyclopedic in nature, giving us a glimpse of a young Oxford man's knowledge (with all its deficiencies) of the world in 1621, the original date of publication. When the author comes to Siena, for example, he tells us of the Sienese Pope Pius II, and as he moves through Germany,



he describes the spread of Lutheranism. The first edition contained the remark that "France is a greater and more famous kingdom" than England. The author diplomatically explained to the outraged James I that "is" was a mistake for "was," but wisely thought it best to cut the sentence from subsequent editions. Well over half the volume is devoted to Europe, and the Near East, as the land of the Bible, is also extensively described. The African section is focused on North Africa, with Egypt taking the lion's share, and almost no knowledge of sub-Saharan Africa except for Madagascar is manifested. Heylyn opens his final section, on America, with the prescient remark that instead of "America," "this great tract of land ought, and that most aptly, to bee called the New World; New for the late discovery, and World, for the vast spaciousness of it." He tells of Columbus and has a good deal of information on Mexico, Nicaragua, Brazil, Peru, and Cuba. Heylyn mentions Virginia, Florida, and the French discoveries in Canada, but the rest of North America is a blank to him, as he wrote only a year after the pilgrims had arrived on its shores. Peter Heylyn (1600-62) was a lecturer on historical geography at Oxford; this book constitutes, in effect, his lecture notes. An advocate of high-church Anglicanism, Heylyn won the favor of Charles I and Archbishop Laud, and opposed the Parliamentarians as well as Prynne for his writing of Histrio-mastix. The present work is his first; Heylyn, to whom controversy was meat and drink, went on to pen more than 50 more books. Early editions of this work are uncommon to begin with and are rarely found, as here, in unrepaired original bindings.

Matthew Fontaine Maury was an American oceanographer, meteorologist and officer in the United States Navy. He became the first superintendent of the U.S. Naval Observatory in 1842. His publications and system of recording nautical data was used to develop charts for major trade routes. First published in 1855 it was reprinted many times.





Fleury Mesplet was born about 1735 in St. Nizier, France. He engaged in printing and moved, probably in 1773, to London, where he met Benjamin Franklin who encouraged him to immigrate to Philadelphia. In 1776 he was commissioned by the Continental Congress to accompany its commissioners, Franklin, Chase and Carroll, to Montreal to establish there a French press. He moved his equipment from Philadelphia, the journey occupying from March 18 to May 6, 1776. When the Americans evacuated soon afterwards the item above was printed, the first in Montreal. He continued to operate through economic and political vicissitudes, until his death in 1794. He is credited with atleast 70 books, pamphlets, etc., including the Montreal Gazette, which he founded in 1785 and which still exists.





He became fascinated with local musical heritage, and made two trips, in 1905 to the north-eastern Brazilian states, and in 1912 to the Amazonian interior, in search of native folk songs. This music proved to be inspirational in his future works, which received




much acclaim for their originality. Villa-Lobas was offered a government grant to study music in Paris from 1923-1930, and on his return was named director of music education in Rio de Janeiro. He devised a method of teaching choral music to school children, incorporating the folk songs he had collected in his travels. The Uirapuru is an Amazonian bird, as well as a mythological creature. The bird sings only once a year, for a few minutes in the morning while building its nest, "the sound is melodic and beautiful. There is a belief that a human being is transformed after death into an uirapuru, whose song breathes life into the quiet of the forest. Villa-Lobos' Uirapuru was first presented as a ballet in Buenos Aries on May 25th, 1935.






aid the British. His wife joined him there in the spring of 1777 and accompanied him on the campaign under Burgoyne which went south into New York that fall, ending in the defeat and surrender of all of Burgoyne's forces at Saratoga on October 17, 1777. The Riedesels were then captives of the Ameri-cans (although under loose parole), first at Cambridge and then in Virginia, whence the captive army was moved in late 1778. There life was quite pleasant, and the prisoners became friendly with Thomas Jefferson. Later they spent time in Pennsylvania, Bethlehem, New York and Canada, before finally returning to Europe in 1783. "Mme Riedesel's narrative and descriptions are written with impressive directness and simplicity; there is a quality of genuineness about them that bespeaks her sterling character and the honesty of her record" - Clark.




Rolph was impressed by the potential of Canada, and indeed for a time was Emigration Agent for the Government of Canada. His careful account of the weather, settlements, and employment opportunities was intended to encourage immigration. He was aware that Britons were apt to think of Canada as a region of ice and snow, home to trappers and Indians.

He visited Upper and Lower Canada at a time of civil stress, but he was confident that "the soundness" of the majority would prevent a break with the British Crown. Blessed with navigable lakes, the mighty St. Lawrence seaway, arable land, a healthy climate and trifling taxes, Rolph considered

Canada an excellent land for industrious artisans and people of some capital. ". . .in Upper Canada, a native of Great Britain can hold property at once, becomes eligible to every office, and is indeed and in fact fully entitled to all the rights and privileges he enjoyed at home, and happily exempt from all the burdens which must necessarily co-exist with a huge national debt.



Provenance: The first recorded owner was Dr. Robert Drill. The following is written in pencil (now faded) in German: "Elgen. Von Dr. Drill mit der Bemerkung übergeben, es sei wert, aufbewahrt, zu werden. (Mitte der 30er Jahre)". [Elgen. By Dr. Drill handed over with the comment that it was worth keeping. (mid 30s)]. The present owner found an article published in 1927 that quotes something Drill wrote in the Frankfurter Zeitung (undated) praising Freud.

Mid-1930s: Wilhelm & Elizabeth Hollbach received the book from Dr Robert Drill who was Jewish and fleeing Germany with minimal possessions, moving to South Africa. Dr Drill and Wilhelm Hollbach were colleagues and friends. Dr Robert Drill worked at the Frankfurter Zeitung newspaper with Reiner Hollbach's father Wilhelm Hollbach (link is to wikipedia page about Wilhelm - he was editor of the newspaper and acting mayor of Frankfurt immediately after the war).

Post-WW II: In Germany, Elgen Hollbach received the book from their mother Elizabeth Hollbach after the Second World War, when she (Elgen) became interested in psychotherapy and later became a licensed psychotherapist. The inscription (see above) is assumed to be written by Elizabeth Hollbach.


Mid-1990s: The book was received by Canadian relatives from Elgen Hollbach from Germany.

#### Printing and the Mind of Man. 389.

Sigmund Freud (1856-1939). Die Tramdeutung. Leipzig & Lienna. Deuticke. 1900.

Freud qualified as a doctor in 1881. In 1883 he took the advice of Josef Breuer, a practicing physician and a family friend, and began to specialize in neurology. In 1885 he went to Paris and studied under J.M. Charcot, the greatest neurologist of his day. One of the most impressive of Charcot's demonstrations was to induce the symptoms of hysteria in normal patients under hypnosis. This indicated clearly that hysteria was a mental affliction and not necessarily a symptom of organic disorder. After his return to Vienna Freud read a paper on the subject before the Gesellschaft der Aertze which was not treated with the seriousness it deserved.

In 1889 Freud went to Nancy to witness the experiments in hypnosis of Hippolyte Bernheim, whose work, like that of Charcot, he translated into German. These were experiments in post-hypnotic suggestion; and what impressed Freud most deeply was the reluctance of the subject to divulge the true reason for his actions. Only after persistent questioning were false reasons abandoned and the truth disclosed. Freud suggested to Breuer a joint study of the subject, combining Breuer's knowledge with that gleaned from Charcot and Bernheim. Breuer was a much older man but eventually his reluctance to resume interest in the subject was conquered by Freud's



persistence. In january 1893 they published jointly a paper in the Neurologisches Centralblatt on the treatment of hysteria, which was followed in 1895 by Studien uber Hysteric.

Very briefly, what they had done was to reverse Charcot's experiment. He induced hysteria in normal subjects under hypnosis — they used hypnosis to release hysterical patients from their affliction. Their experience was that patients who could be induced to recall the circumstances associated with the onset of hysteria would thus purge themselves of the disorder. For this reason they called their methods 'cathartic'.

Freud, however, had learned from Bernheim that subjects would be unlikely to know the reasons for their actions, because they were buried deep in what Freud called the 'unconscious mind'. Only by allowing the patient to talk at random was it possible eventually to unearth the true cause of the trouble. This was called 'free association'. It will be seen that not only had some of the essentials of what was to become psychoanalysis already emerged by 1895 but that a revolution in mental therapy had been adumbrated.

'Studies in Hysteria' made impact only in so far as its conclusions were fiercely contested by the medical profession: Kraift-Ebing, in 1896, in the chair at one of Freud's papers, described it as 'a scientifoc fairy-tale'. Yet bitter disappointment did not diminish Freud's enthusiasm. In 1894-5 he was already developing his theories of obsessional neuroses, which explained the remoteness of 'replacement ideas' as the covering up of painful experiences; and also the most controversial of all his theories, that the painful experiences were usually of sexual origin.


Although not published until 1900 'The Interpretation of Dreams' was virtually complete in all essentials at the beginning of 1896. Extending the wish-fulfillment nature of day-dreams to night-dreams, Freud differentiated the two kinds of wish: those in day-dreams being open conscious, while the less pleasant subjects were repressed, to be released from the subconscious only in sleep when the censorship of consciousness is relaxed.

This is unquestionably Freud's greatest single work. It contains all the basic components of psychoanalytic theory and practice; the erotic nature of dreams, the 'opedipus complex', the libdio, and the rest; all related to the backgouund of the 'unconscious', later to be called the 'sub-conscious'.



Archdekin, Richard (1618-1693), Jesuit, also known as Arsdekin, and Mac Giolla Cuddy. Born Kilkenny, 16 March, 1618. Studied theology at Louvain. Entered Society of Jesus at Mechlin on 28 Sept 1642. Professor of philosophy, moral theology and scripture for many years at Louvain and Antwerp. Proficient in Irish, English, Latin and Dutch. Published A Treatise on Miracles (1667), in Irish and English, perhaps the first book printed jointly in the two language. His life of St Patrick (1671) included the prophecies of St Malachy concerning the succession of the Popes. His *Controversiae Fidei*, a theological

work, went into thirteen editions between 1671 and 1718. Later editions under the title *Theologia Tripartita Univera*, included the lives of Oliver Plunkett and Peter Talbot, with other material on Ireland. Died at Antwerp, 31 August 1693. - Boylan p6-7.

Webb. p5... suggests "... a famous Jesuit, and controversial writer, was born in Kilkenny, 1619. At Louvain and Antwerp he filled successively the chairs of classical literature, moral philosophy, and theology., and acquired the reputation of an able divine. ... He was the author of several books which enjoyed extensive popularity. His *Essay on Miracles* was said to be the first work printed in English and Irish conjointly. ...


Graesse I-71. BM 19-50. RLIN lists 5 copies. Pontius Meropius Anicius Paulinus was born into a wealthy Roman family in Bordeaux and was educated by the poet Ausonius. His career as a lawyer and senator included distinguished appointments in various parts of Italy, but he



gradually became disillusioned with political life. He converted to Christianity, and began distributing his wealth to the poor. After the death of their infant son, Paulinus and his wife Therasia established a religious community at the shrine of St. Felix in Nola. The site included a monastery, basilica and guest houses for pilgrims. Paulinus' letters and lyrical poems, written between 395 and 431, tell of the depth of his continuous spiritual inquiry, but also describe the practical concerns of his mission in Nola. In Epistle no. 12 (numbered 32 in editions where the letters are organized by date), he discusses his plans for the construction and ornamentation of the new basilica, particularly the inscriptions that adorned the doorways and arches linking the buildings. Paulinus' collected letters and poems were first published in Paris in 1516. In this later edition, the letters are grouped by addressee, the majority to Paulinus' friend Sulpicius Severus (c.360-425). The preface and commentary are by Heribertus

Rosweyde (1569-1629), a Jesuit scholar and the initial author of the Acta Sanctorum, a multi-volume hagiography published between 1643 and 1794. The printers,

Balthasar Moretus, Ioannes Moretus II, and Jean van Meurs, successors to the famous Plantin press, were active in Antwerp between 1618 and 1629.





The Era of Napoleon, 1991, #18621, but not this edition.

Sir Walter Scott (1771-1832) first published his influential biography on Napoleon in 9 volumes, in Edinburgh, 1827. It was published, according to some, to prevent impending bankruptcy and although it succeeded in the latter goal, the work was too long to be popular (Caldwell, p.500). As a result, many abridged editions followed. The original Exeter edition was printed in 1827 and a second Exeter appeared in 1828, followed by this version, which is probably the third printing in America of the work. Scott's biography stirred up some controversy regarding its objectivity, since it portrays Napoleon, unrelentingly, in an unfavourable light. Despite these protests, the work represents an important contemporary contribution to the study of France during the Napoleonic Era.
