



John Andrè, 1751-1780. British soldier, son of Genevese (the French-speaking part of Switzerland) parents. Joined Royal Fusiliers in Canada (1774); aide-de-camp to General Grey and Sir Henry Clinton; made adjutant general by Clinton, with rank of major. Appointed to negotiate with Benedict Arnold for betrayal of West Point to the British; captured by Americans while returning toward New York in civilian clothes with negotiation papers in his boots; hanged as a spy.

'The portrait of Andrè was engraved by Hopwood, probably from the print by J.K. Sherwin. Letters from Andrè to Miss Seaward written in 1769 are included on pp.336-357. This book was published by Mr Smith to justify his own character against the charge of being involved in the Arnold Treason.'







The most important source for information about Burgoyne's campaign during the Revolutionary War. He presents to the House of Commons his defense of his conduct as the commander of the British expedition down the Hudson Valley from Canada in 1777. The expedition ended in disaster at Saratoga, where nearly 20,000 American forces under Gen. Gates soundly defeated Burgoyne's army of 5,000 and forced his surrender. He points out he had requested a force of 12,000 men, to achieve what had been asked of him. The excellent maps are by William Faden.


Howes C-499. Sabin 13751. The finger pointing after the withdrawal of British forces from the American colonies was exemplified by the war of words between Clinton and Cornwallis. Clinton had been head of His Majesty's forces in 1781, and was based in New York; Cornwallis was his second, in command of the southern forces. Clinton had ordered Cornwallis to not leave Georgia, but contradictory orders and circumstances encouraged Cornwallis to take his forces north, where he and Clinton were to combine armies. Delaying actions by the Americans including Cowpens and Guilford Court House forced Cornwallis to encamp at Yorktown, where Clinton's forces were to arrive, coming down the Chesapeake from Head of Elk; the recent arrival of French troop ships which anchored at the southern end of the Bay prevented Clinton from sailing directly. The British forces were thus divided and unable to connect or communicate, and an American siege at Yorktown forced Cornwallis to capitulate, ending the conflict. Clinton defended his conduct in print in early 1783, Cornwallis replied, Clinton returned the favor (present title), and the war of words and honor was on. Clinton came from a military family, while Cornwallis had the advantage of peerage, a distinction never lost on Clinton, who had heard the rumors and felt he had to protect whatever honor he had left. Regardless of who was at greater fault, Clinton's military and political career after 1781 was negligible, while within a few years Cornwallis was appointed governor-general of India.

An important history of the Seven Years' War, including the French War and the Indigenous people in North America. Entick was an English historian and author of several works on British history in the 18th century. The work narrates the events that occurred between 1756 and 1763 to establish control over Silesia and for colonial supremacy in North America and India mainly between France and Great Britain. The war involved the vast majority of the great powers of the time, having affected Europe, North America, Central America, the west coast of Africa, India, and the Philippines. It is considered the first large-scale war fought on several continents, and the main global conflict prior to the Napoleonic Wars and the two World Wars. The folded maps include a map of North America, a map of the West Indies, a map of the East Indies, and a plan of the Siege of Quebec.



John Norton (Teyoninhokarawen) (born 1770, Scotland (?)- died 1827, Upper Canada)[1] was adopted by the Mohawk at about age 30 at their major reserve in Canada. After deserting the British military in the late 18th century, he became a military leader of Iroquois warriors in the War of 1812 on behalf of Great Britain against the United States. Commissioned as a major, he led warriors from the Six Nations of the Grand River into battle against American invaders at Queenston Heights, Stoney Creek, and Chippawa.



Likely born and educated in Scotland, he had a Scottish mother and a Cherokee father. His father was born in Keowee circa 1740, and was saved by British soldiers when they burned the town during the Anglo-Cherokee War. They took him to England and placed him with an English family. As an adult with the baptized surname Norton, he married a Scottish woman, with who he had a son with.


The junior John Norton joined the British Army, serving in Ireland before being assigned to Lower Canada after the American Revolutionary War. While there he became interested in the Six Nations of Grand River, ultimately learning the Mohawk language and culture, and being adopted into a family of the tribe. In 1804 on a diplomatic trip representing the Iroquois to England, he translated the Gospel of John into Mohawk for the British and Foreign Bible Society. This work was distributed in Upper Canada beginning in 1806.

Norton traveled in the American Southeast in 1809-1810, visiting many Cherokee towns and meeting some of his father's relatives. He documented much about Cherokee culture and included this material in his journal, which primarily recounted events of the War of 1812. It is unique for his perspective on the war as an acculturated Mohawk raised in the British Isles. The memoir, The Journal of Major John Norton, 1816, was not published until 1970 in an annotated edition by The Champlain Society; other annotated versions have also been published, including the Society's 2011 version. Pouchot, an engineer and a soldier, was entrusted with rebuilding the defenses of Fort Niagara, where he became commandant. Although he considered the





fort impregnable, he was forced to surrender to Sir William Johnson in July, 1759. After an exchange of prisoners, he was put in charge of Fort Levis where he capitulated to the superior forces of General Amherst in July, 1760. Upon his return to France, he was accused of having shared in the corruption which led to the loss of Canada. These memoirs were written with the motives of self vindication and are an invaluable record of the War, especially of the sieges of Fort Niagara and Fort Levis. In them he discusses the corruption in the colonial administration, the morale of the French troops, as well as giving a lengthy and detailed account of the topography of Canada, of the modes of Indian warfare, and of the manners and customs of the Indians.

The engraved maps include a plan of Fort Niagara and Pouchot's defences; a map of part of the St. Lawrence River showing Fort Levis and the adjacent islands with the position of Lord Amherst's flotilla; and a large map of the entire French and English frontier from Montreal to Fort Du Quesne. Unobtrusive inked annotations, probably 19th century, on the large map appear to indicate part of the campaign studied by a previously unidentified owner. They highlight the route from Lake Ontario to Montreal. Also, there are several neatly inked marginalia




toward the end of volume II, where the battle at Fort Levis is described by Pouchot. The notes contradict Pouchot by citing references to Mante and other contemporary writers.

The Regiment fought in France, Gallipoli, Macedonia and Palestine. The Regiment was disbanded in 1922 with the formation of the modern Irish Free State. Colonel Whitton also wrote "Wolfe and North America" (1929).







The original edition was the first separately published account of the military fame and character of the illustrious British general. The author was a prominent British physician and founder of modern military medicine, best known for his 'Observations On The Diseases of the Army" (London. 1752). Wolfe and Pringle both served in Flanders (1742-45) and may well have met when Wolfe was recovering from fatigue following the Battle of Dettingen. Recalled in 1745 to serve against the Jacobites, both were on the staff of the Duke of Cumberland at Culloden.




