"The `Endurance' expedition, led by Shackleton, intended to cross the Antarctic continent but their ship was trapped in ice in the Weddell Sea, drifting for ten months before being crushed and sunk. The expedition then drifted on the ice for several more months finally reaching Elephant Island. From there Shackleton and five others made a 14 day voyage in an open boat to South Georgia. The whole ordeal ranked with Bligh's boat voyage after the `Bounty' mutiny.

II.-The Cartography of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, from Cartier to Champlain.

By W. F. GANONG, A.M.

#### (Presented by Dr. George Stewart, May 8, 1889.)

At its meeting in May, 1887, the present writer had the honor to lay before this Society, a paper on the first voyage of Jacques Cartier to Canada. At that time the importance of the bearing of this voyage upon the subsequent cardgraphy of the Galf had not become evident to me, but a more careful and comprehensive study since then of this in connection with other early voyages and with early maps, has made it clear that it is of the greatest importance. The first voyage of Cartier to the Gulf quite overshadows, from a cardgraphical point of view, his later ones, and indeed all of those of the Sixteenth Century. Its results largely moulded the maps of this region for nearly eighty years; and the various discrepancies and errors of these maps, as well as the differences of opinion and inaccuracies of some late writers, have been due to a lack of that true interpretation of Cartier's course which is the key to the situation. So marked and important is this, that I may be pardoned for repeating with greater emphasis what is in reality the text of this paper :—The correct interpretation of Cartier's first voyage is the key to the cardgraphy of the Gulf for almost the twobenent catary. This statement I hope to substantiate in the following pages.

In order that we may have a connected view of the whole subject, I must ask you to briefly review Cartier's itinerary as set forth in the paper'referred to. In this connection it will be necessary to mention the different and sometimes inconsistent views held by several writers, since these have directed the writings on the subject.

> I. Voyages of Cartier and Contemporaries.

> > A.-Cartier's First Voyaye.

Cartier, with two ships, left St. Malo on April 20th, 1584. He made land at Cape Bonavista, May 10th, and, after spending some days in Catalina Harbor, visited Fank Ialands to provision his ships with the birds there. He entered the Strait of Belle Isle early in June, and coasted along the Labrador shore as far as the present Cumberland



It may perhaps be considered rather late in the day now, after all the learned essays that have been written on this subject, especially in these latter years, to attempt to throw any new light on Cartier's interary in the Gulf of St. Lavrence. Yet I presume to do so, and when a writer, altogether unknown and without a name, comes forward upon a well-beaten track, and pretends to overturn the theories of long-established orities, and renowned stadents, he is supposed to be able to show some credentials of great weight and authority in order to entitle him to a hearing. It will be asked, then, on what ples do I pretend to give a final decision on a point which has up to the present day defied the penetration of the keenest historical students? I reply :

The very fact that this research *has* defied the writers who have attacked it, is one reason why the field is still open to investigation. The earlier writers, Lesenrbot, Charlevoix, Garnier, Ferland, Brasseur de Bourbourg, &c., having had access only to multilated and incomplete extracts of Cartier's Relation, are hopelessly confusing and contradictory in their accounts of these voyages. The later writers, though enjoying the full benefit of the entire Relation originale, have not been able to steer their course clear through the narrative.

The very latest writer who has touched on the subject—the learned Dr. Bourinot, in " Cape Breton and its Memorials," at page 183—shows how all the writers who have lately attacked this hierary and geographical pazzle, while each contradicting the other, have not been able to lay down anything for certain themselves; and the learned author ends by contradicting or disagreeing with them all. My claim then, to "supervised light" is based on the fact that my position as Bishop on

My claim then, to "superior light" is based on the fact that my position as Bishop on the West Coast of Newfoundhand, and my residence for the past eight years at hay St. George, together with a personal experience of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, now ranging over trentysthric years, has given me an opportunity of travelling over and over again on the very route first explored by Cartier. With the *Relation Original* is an yguidebook, I have followed him from harbour to harbour; identifying and locating with absolute certainty, all the places described in the narrative. I have had, moreover, the advantage of consulting on the obscure and obsoleto passages of the *Relation* the French fishing captains of St. Malo, St. Brieux, La Rochelle, and ther places of Brittany and Normandy, who come on there every year to make their fishery, just as they did in the days of Cartier ; and who preserve all the quaintness of customs and language of those days which are unintelligible even to the learned Frenchman of to-day. It has been the source of intense pleasure to me to verify the

The places visited and named by Jacques Cartier in his first and second voyages have been the subject of much discussion by authors who have attempted to identify them. The results of their efforts have varied widely, but in general the correctness of the identifications made has doubtless improved as more accurate geographical and historical data have become available. One unfortunate obstacle to the attainment of identifications that are entirely satisfactory has been the fact that the learned men who have wrestled with these problems have often been without personal familiarity with the areas under discussion and have had to depend upon descriptions and maps which had been made by others and which were sometimes faulty. Expecially has this been so in the case of places on the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and in the Magalaen Islands.

It is true that Bishop M. F. Howley, in his paper entitled "Cartier's Course-a Last Word", claimed to have personal knowledge of the places that Cartier had visited, but his treatment of the subject contains internal evidence to show that, while he was undoubtedly familiar with the coast of Newfoundland, he had little or no personal acquaintance with some of the other regions of which he wrote, particularly with the north shore of the Gulf. Having spent thirtens summers in voyaging back and forth along

Having spent thirteen summers in voyaging back and forth along the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lavrence, generally in charge of the navigation of the bold of St. Lavrence, generally in charge of the acquaintance with many of the places in those regions which were visited and mentioned by Cartier. My reading of his account of his explorations was naturally followed by endeavours to identify, as a matter of interest, the places to which he referred. When I came to compare my identifications with those of the various writers on this subject, both agreements and disagreements inevitably appeared, and continued study failed to enable me to accept all the identifications proposed in the best and most recent discussion of these questions. I had the great pleasure and privilege of corresponding with Dr. H. P. Biggar about most of the identifications of such places on the north shore of the Gulf and of interviewing him personally about them in 1927.



Later he devoted much of his time to researching and writing his Acadia, the object of which was to give a summary of the early history of Acadia and to focus on the unjust expulsion of the Acadians, and attributing the fault to the governor of Nova Scotia, Charles Lawrence, for this policy. "The book was later edited [and translated] by Henri d'Arles (ie. Henri Beaudé) who superimposed his own thesis, placing responsibility for the expulsion on the British government." (Story, Oxford companion to Canadian History, p. 709). An important contribution to the debates surrounding the deportation of the Acadians.

An autobiography of Quebec businessman and politician, Charles Seraphin Rodier (Jr,), 6 October 1818 – 26 January 1890. Born in Montreal, Lower Canada, the son of Jean-Baptiste Rodier and Marie-Desanges Sedillot de Montreuil, Rodier was the nephew of Charles-Séraphin Rodier, a mayor of Montreal. Rodier would later use the suffix "Jr" to his name to tell himself apart from his uncle. Rodier started working at age fourteen as a carpenter and after as a building contractor. He later started a factory to make agricultural tools for farmers. He used to demand mortgages in return for the tools and as a result accumulated a large amount of land in the Montreal area.

In 1861, he co-founded the Banque Jacques-Cartier and was a director until 1870. He was also a vice-president from 1870 to 1876. From 1847 to 1850, he was a member of the Montreal City Council for the ward of Saint-Antoine. A supported of the federal Conservative Party, Rodier was called to the Senate of Canada for the senatorial division of Mille Isles on the advice of Prime Minister John A. Macdonald in 1888. He served until his death in 1890.


He was president of the Saint-Jean-Baptiste Society of Montreal. In 1869, he helped form the 64th Châteauguay and Beauharnois Regiment (Voltigeurs Canadiens of Beauharnois), becoming its first lieutenant-colonel.

General James Wolfe (1727-1759) died during his famous victory over the French at Quebec, which delivered Canada into the hands of the British. The engraving depicts the general surrounded by his officers and a native American warrior, with ships in the background. The original heroic painting by Benjamin West (1738-1820) of 1771 was an instant success and the engraving by William Woollett which followed was one of the most commercial successful prints ever published (Von Erffa & Staley, The paintings of Benjamin West, p.213). In death, General Wolfe gained fame as a national hero and became an icon of the Seven Years' War and



British dominance in late eighteenth century North America. William Woollett's engraving was the best-known copy of West's original and became popular around the world -

"William Woollett (1735-1785) was one of the most eminent of English engravers, and became Engraver to the King in 1775. His fine plate of The Death of Wolfe is considered one of his greatest achievements. A monument of Woollett by Thomas Banks, R.A., was placed in Westminster Abbey. John Boydell (1719-1804) was a wellknown London engraver and print publisher, famous for his Shakespeare Gallery of prints from pictures painted for it by eminent British artists. He probably did more than anyone else to raise the whole level of English engravings to the high place it occupied in the later eighteenth century." Spendlove p80-82, pl.117. [ca. 47 x 59,5 cm].

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
