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

Field 63. - Back, who had been on both Franklin expeditions, was sent out to locate Ross, who had been unreported through three winters. News of Ross's safe return reached Back in April 1833 and he then pursued the expedition's secondary objectives. These were, firstly, to navigate the length of a river supposedly arising in the neighbourhood of the Great Slave Lake and running north to the Arctic Sea, and then, secondly, to map as much as possible of the sea-coast. He was successful in both objectives, travelling 7,500 miles in total and traversing the full 440-mile length of the river (known as 'Thlueetessy' by the First Nations). The Great Fish River, as Back named it, has since become known as The Back River.

Back discusses in some detail the dealings with the Indian tribes he met along the way, and their dependency upon these natives, especially during the winter. "A fundamental source of information about Indian life along the route of the Arctic expedition." - (Streeter) It was on this expedition of 7,500 miles that Back discovered and named Montreal Island, after the city which had given him such a tumultuous farewell.



The illustrations are winter-scenes in the north-west and Indian habitats. Bompas (1834-1906) was the first bishop of Athabaska, then of Mackenzie River and finally of Selkirk.





T.P.L 593, Lande 960, Strathern 37, Streeter VI-3484, Howes D-376, Sabin 20364, Lada-Mocarski 43, Hill 119, Cowan, p. 70. - The accounts of this expedition relate largely to the geography, ethnology and natural history of the American coast from Nootka Sound northward " Dixon, with Nathanial Portlock, set out in the King George and Queen Charlotte with licenses from both the South Sea Co. and the East India Co. to establish trade in furs. After travelling together they parted, with Portlock remaining in Alaska and Dixon heading southwards. In I789, each published his own account of their combined and separate voyages and each account bears the same title accounting for much of the confusion in the bibliographies. This work, bearing Dixon's name, is thought to have been written largely by William Beresford, Dixon's supercargo, and is sometimes found under his name, but as Dixon edited the letters, was responsible for the maps, and wrote the lengthy introduction, we consider the work properly entered under Dixon's name as editor..







Ellis joined this expedition, consisting of the vessels Dobbs and California, which le?' Gravesend in May, 1746 under Captains Moor and Smith. They stopped at Yarmouth and then crossed the ocean; passing through Hudson's Straits they were finally forced by bad weather to winter in Hayes River,'about three miles above Fort York. In the spring of I 74 7, when the ice broke up, they reprovisioned at the Fort and started on their way; owing to some ill-feeling between the two captains their efforts were not co-ordinated and they ended up duplicating each others discoveries and investigations. The results of the expedition were limited, but they did put an end to the theory that the North West Passage lay through Hudson's Bay. The ships returned to England in I 74 7 and Ellis published this work the following year. Later, whether in acknowledgement of his work or because of family connections, he was appointed governor of Georgia (1757-60) in which position he served very successfully; he was then appointed governor of Nova Scotia, but although he held the title from I 761-63 he never came back to North America and was governor in name only.



This issue (we use the term advisedly, as the type has been reset, to distinguish it from the official 'Second Edition) differs from the first issue in that it includes an extra coloured plate from Richardson's Flora Boreali-Americana," there is additional material added to the introduction; many of the errata have been corrected; the plates have been newly-engraved; there are major additions to the final botanical appendix; the maps are dated November 1823 rather than March 1823; and the map of the Connected Discoveries has been enlarged to include territory south of Hudson's Strait which is not in the earlier map. The object of the expedition was, in part, to determine the longitude and latitude of the northern coast of North America. It is the story of the most frightful journey of 5500 miles in the north, told in detail. The members of the expedition travelled both overland and by canoe; the party was decimated by murder, hunger and cold.





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



"... - Hearne was in the service of the Hudson's Bay Company in Canada for twelve years. He recorded with copious notes the lives of the Indians and the natural history of the regions seen on his three trips. The exploratory expeditions took him by land from Hudson's Bay to the mouth of the Coppermine River at the Arctic Ocean. This work was published from his journals three years after his death, and describes as well the discovery of Great Slave Lake and the impossibility of finding the Northwest Passage through Hudson's Bay.




Part one is a descriptive listing of fifty manuscript voyageur contracts from the French regime and early period of British rule up to 1790. Four contracts are illustrated, and one complete facsimile is tipped in. The second part of the book presents a systematic treatment of the printed contracts of the various firms of the North West Company spanning the period from the 1780's up to the 1821 amalgamation with the Hudson's Bay Co. Sixty-one selected contracts are described of which forty-four are given a full page illustration.

Like Parry, Lyon lived for short periods with the different Eskimos of southern Baffin Island and the Melville peninsula and his affectionate regard for them is revealed in his journal. The fine plates are by Finden after drawings by Lyon. Considered one the best books on the Eskimos and the north.







The year 1819 proved to be exceptionally ice-free and Parry was able to penetrate through Lancaster Sound and Barrow Strait to Melville Island, into the heart of the Arctic, much further than had been reached previously. The ships successfully wintered on the south coast of Melville Island, the first to intentionally do so, and returned in 1820. In one season he had penetrated halfway to Bering Strait and had charted over a thousand miles of unknown coast. In doing so he demonstrated that an Arctic winter could be endured in safety if not comfort, and set the pattern for Arctic expeditions for a generation to come. Parry made two further attempts at the North-West Passage. In 1827 he tried to reach the North Pole and set a new northern record which stood until 1876





In this work, Richardson includes very full accounts of the various searching expeditions for Franklin, up to 1859. There is also a history of Arctic exploration from the 15th to the 19th century, and chapters on the results thus far from the studies done on ethnology, natural history, science, etc. The latter portion of the book concerns itself with the history of the Antarctic regions from the 16th century, the discovery of Victoria Land, and the physical geography of the Antarctic regions.



The beautifully-coloured aquatint plates, engraved by Havell after drawings by Ross, Hoppner, Havell, et al, which illustrate the work, are among the most striking and attractive plates done of the Arctic.

On returning to England his report was at first accepted as conclusive and he was promoted to Captain. A controversy soon arose however, which called his courage into question and opened a life-long quarrel with the then secretary of the Admiralty, Sir John Barrow. Appended are various scientific and natural history notes.



"In 1833 Bibaud accepted from the government the posts of clerk of the market and inspector of weights and measures in Montreal. Four years later he was appointed justice of the peace and that year he published his Histoire du Canada sous la domination française. Journalism continued to attract him, and in 1842 he started L'Encyclopédie canadienne, a monthly through which he hoped to further the arts, letters, and sciences. The experiment once again proved disappointing, and L'Encyclopédie canadienne ceased to appear in February 1843. As well, Bibaud became a translator for the Canadian Agricultural Journal in 1843, and for the Geological Survey of Canada, directed by William Edmond Logan*, in 1844. His Histoire du Canada et des Canadiens, sous la domination anglaise was also published in 1844.



For nearly 30 years Bibaud had worked tirelessly to raise the cultural level of his compatriots, whom he exhorted to intellectual effort. Despite unremitting work, repeated complaints, and sometimes severe reprimands, he never managed to capture the public's interest. His harsh, unpolished, dry style and the often moralizing tone of his writings, as well as his monotonous and slipshod way of presenting information in his weighty periodicals, no doubt put readers off and explain his lack of success.". 
"Gonzague Ducharme, nicknamed le père Ducharme, was without doubt Canada's best-known antiquarian bookseller during the first half of the twentieth century. He opened his bookstore in Montreal in 1914, and when he died in 1950, his inventory of approximately 350,000 books occupied three stories. According to the founder of Dora Hood's Book Room in Toronto, Ducharme 'was head and shoulders above us all in his knowledge of Canadian books, both English and French ... and he willingly shared his knowledge with his clients and colleagues". The original oil paintings of which the plates were copies were all destroyed in the 1865 Smithsonian fire". (Howes). "The work is one of the most costly and important ever published on the American Indians. The plates are accurate portraits of celebrated chiefs, or of characteristic individuals of the race; and are coloured with care, to faithfully represent their features and costumers. (Field). It faithfully records the features and dress of celebrated American Indians who lived and died before the age of photography. Their tribes resided west of the Mississippi visited only by occasional trappers and the courageous Lewis and Clark, in a land considered distant and remote, 1830-1840's. The work is an eloquent record of Indian life while it was still largely untouched by white influence.


"It was not, until years after Thomas Traill's death on 21 June 1859, when she was at last established in the Lakefield cottage, Westove, arranged for her by Sam Strickland, that she had the opportunity to collaborate with her widowed niece, Agnes Dunbar FitzGibbon [Moodie*], daughter of Susanna Moodie and, like her mother, a skilled illustrator of flowers. Agnes not only taught herself lithography but secured publication by John Lovell in 1868 of Canadian Wildflowers, to which she contributed the illustrations and Catharine the text. The book was sold by subscription and went through at least four editions. The collaboration resumed years later when, in 1884, Agnes, then Mrs Chamberlin and settled in Ottawa, undertook negotiations for publication there of Catharine's fullest nature work, Studies of Plant Life in Canada; or, Gleanings from Forest, Lake and Plain (1885). A far more interesting and approachable book than its scientific title would seem to suggest, it led a friendly authority in Ottawa, James Fletcher*, to praise her descriptive skills as "one of the greatest botanical triumphs which [anyone] could achieve." Carl Clinton Berger has called the book "a splendid anachronism," directing attention not only to the delays in publication but to the spirited approach that characterizes Traill's inventories and her floral biographies. Though she was not a critical scientist she brought a passion to her study that has won her considerable admiration. Under less adverse circumstances her work might have been published earlier, thereby earning her a more significant place in the evolution of botanical studies in Canada. "DCB.





Trial of Paul Brown and F.F. Boucher for the murder of Robert Semple; Trial of John Siveright, Alexander Mackenzie, Hugh McGillis, John McDonald, John McLaughlin, and Simon Fraser as accessaries after the fact; and Trial of John Cooper and Hugh Bennerman for theft.

Robert Semple, 1777-1816, was named Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company Territories in April, 1815, by Lord Selkirk. He arrived with a second detachment of settlers in August 1815, when he learned that the Red River Settlement had been destroyed by the Nor'westers. Over the winter of 1816 the settlement was rebuilt and re-inhabited by Selkirk's colonists under Governor Semple's leadership. The following year, on June 19, 1816, a party of some 60 or 70 Metis under Cuthbert Grant, who were bringing pemmican from the Plains for the North-West Company brigades arrived at the settlement. There they met Semple and about twenty-five Hudson Bay Company men and settlers at a place on the Red River called Seven Oaks (Winnipeg), and in the ensuing battle Semple and about 20 of his men were killed. Again, the settlement surrendered and the colonists were dispersed. Two of Grant's party, Paul Brown and F.F. Boucher were later tried in York, U.C., for murder, and six of the North-West Company partners as accessaries after the fact. All were acquitted.

Charles Wilkes (1798-1877) consisted of six ships and lasted from 1838 to 1842, logging 87,000 miles, surveying 280 Pacific Islands, creating 180 charts (some still used in WWII), surveyed 800 miles of the Pacific Northwest (of what would become Oregon and Washington states). Amazingly, in fragile wooden boats, the Expedition charted 1500 miles of the Antarctic Continent which still today bears the name "Wilkes Land". The scientists with the Expedition are noted as bringing back over forty tons of artifacts and specimens that would become the foundation of the Smithsonian Institution. One of the lasting minor legacies of the voyage was by a seaman on the Expedition, Charles Erskine who wrote "Twenty Years Before the Mast" in 1890 (see Rostove 116). Although a mere lieutenant in command of the Expedition, Wilkes was eventually promoted to admiral in the U.S. Navy. The U.S. Exploring Expedition had great significance for the United States establishing it as a major naval and scientific power throughout the world.



The author was a Scotsman who served in the British army in India, Goa, Java, etc, When he returned home after seven years, he packed up his family and went to Canada, and in his last two letters discusses his taking up residence in Montreal and then joining Maitland Cs Battalion of Volunteers at the start of the "disturbances" in late 1837. The appendix consists of his descriptions of India, Madeira, Bombay, Tanna, Goa, Madras, Malacca, Java, Sourabaya, and St. Helena.

"Obliged, while here, to work at his trade for his daily subsistence, he contrived to find leisure to send forth into the literary world the above mentioned work, which was extremely creditable to him, and would have been creditable to any one; for while interesting events and descriptions, in tolerable number, are dispersed through the work, light incidents are told in such a palatable way, and with such an easy grace, and often so archly, as to make the perusal of the volume a very agreeable relaxation". - Herald, Montreal". Morgan.

John Williamson (-1840), a British soldier, came to Canada and served as a sergeant in the battalion volunteers formed in Montreal because of the Rebellion of 1837-8. As "J.W." he published his autobiography, The Narrative of a Commuted Pensioner (2 vols., 1838), queried as a anonymous fiction in Bibliography of Canadian Fictions (1904) by L.E. Horning and L.J. Burpee. (Cf, Morgan, Bib. Can, (1867); Wallace (D.C.B).
