He travelled overland to Great Slave Lake, descended the Fish (now Back) River, then unexplored, to the Arctic Ocean. He was a talented artist and the engravings are most attractive.

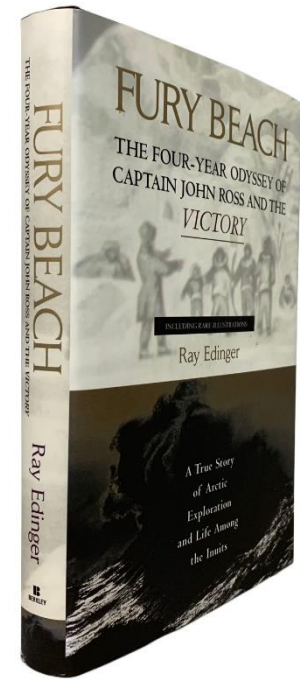


Smith 2389. Cf. A.B. 3839. (2nd ed. 1884). One of the most tragic of polar expeditions. The expedition under the authority of the U.S. Navy sailed from San Francisco in 1879, and cleared the Bering Strait, going adrift near Herald Island in November of the same year. The vessel drifted in the ice for nineteen months, and was finally crushed and sunk in June 1881. Thirty-three men left the ship, of whom 25 reached the Lena Delta, where De Long and 11 others died.

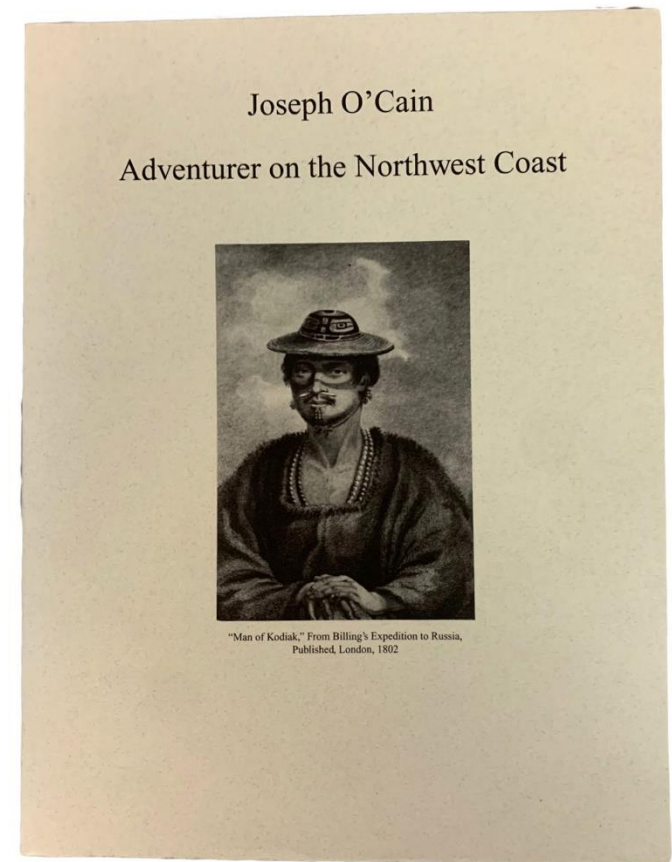

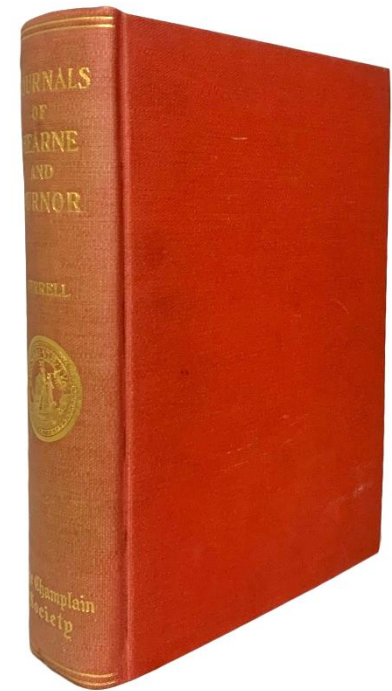

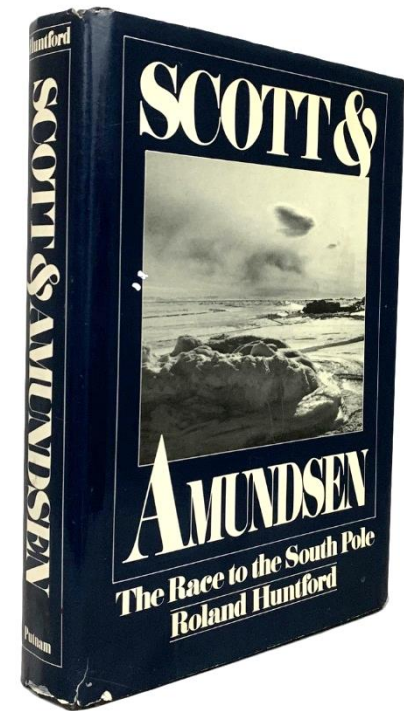

The map of North America published by Arrowsmith in London in 1795 embodied the results of his surveys. While wintering at Cumberland House about 1790 he taught surveying to David Thompson.

Hubbard's predicted trip was subsequently carried out by his widow A Woman's Way through unknown Labrador, 1908.

"Dear Mr. Robertson, What a very nice thing for you to do! The bowl of yellow roses and irises are beautiful-still as fresh and lovely as when they came amazingly! ... They are doing a thorough check on my back and all that ails me ... not at all the "terrible operation on my back" that seems to be circulating. Every good wish to you for the work that you are doing. I am sure you find the youngsters refreshing, and I am sure they enjoy you. Sincerely, Olive Diefenbaker."

Olive Diefenbaker (1902-1976), wife of John Diefenbaker, Prime Minister of Canada 1957-1963. They were married from 1953 until her death in 1976.

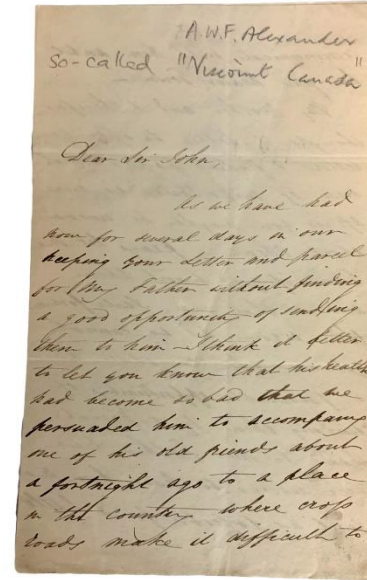

29. [HUMPHRYS-ALEXANDER, Alexander William Francis, Self-styled Viscount]

2 ALS, 1 signed 'Canada' to 'Dear Sir John', (John PHILLIPART, 1784-1874, the military historian), saying "As we have had now for several days ... your Letter and parcel for my Father ... I think it better to let you know that his health had become so bad that we persuaded him ... about a fortnight ago" to go to "a place in the country", his mother and he opened the letters "& finding papers which seem of importance we were afraid you might be uneasy about them ... we were desired to leave him as quiet as possible for a little while ... we hope that he will be better able soon to attend to business", 3 sides, 8vo., n.d., note by Sir John on 4th side 'July 1833', with 1 signed 'E.J. Alexander' to Sir John Philipart, saying "My nephew is exceedingly anxious to go to the Ball at the Guildhall to be given to the Prince and Princess" of Wales, newly married, "Can you ... obtain an invitation for one or two?", 10 Beaumont Street, Portland Place, 30th May 1863, two items 1833 and 1863. 300.00



The writer's father, Alexander Humphrys, (1783-1859), added the surname Alexander in 1824 and set about claiming the Earldom of Stirling, extinct since 1739. He alleged that he was descended from the 1st Earl, the famous Sir William Alexander of Menstrie, favourite of James VI and I. The 1st Earl was given the right to create for sale 100 (later 150) baronetcies of Nova Scotia. Humphrys-Alexander succeeded in voting as a Scottish Representative Peer in 1825, 1830 and 1831, and on the 2nd July 1831, was served 'heir special to the 1st Earl in his possessions in Nova Scotia' of which he had sasine six days later at Edinburgh Castle. His motive now appeared four days later. As 'Hereditary Lieutenant and Lord Proprietor of the Province of Nova Scotia, and the Lordship of Canada', he offered for sale '1,000,000 acres of the most excellent land in New Brunswick'. However, all services as heir except that to his mother were reduced (rescinded) in 1836, and in 1839 he was indicted for forging the excerpt. It was unanimously pronounced a forgery by the commission of which, however, he was acquitted. (See 'The Complete Peerage', Vol. XII, Appendix G). - John Phillipart, military historian and Knight of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, helped to revive the Order in England after the Napoleonic wars, and was chancellor of the English Language for 43 years. He also helped found the West London Hospital at Hammersmith.

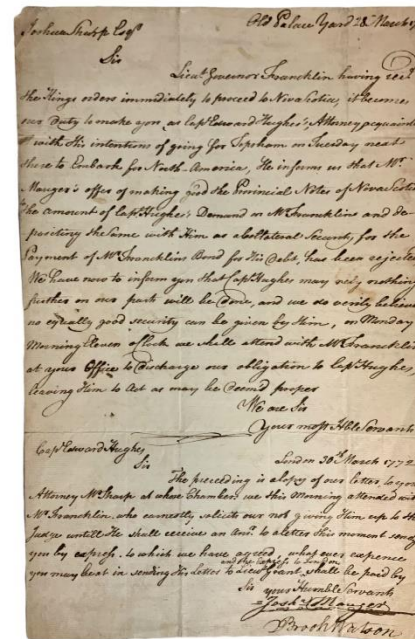
30. MAUGER, Joshua (sea-captain, businessman, and politician) and Brook WATSON (merchant).

Autograph Letter, Signed to Joshua SHARPE, (attorney) and to Edward HUGHES (captain). London, 28th and 30th, March, 1772.

A two part autographed letter addressed to Captain Edward Hughes and his attorney Joshua Sharpe from Nova Scotia notables, Joshua Mauger and Brook Watson, on behalf of Lieut-Governor of Nova Scotia, Michael Francklin. The letter is addressed London 30 March 1772 on Francklin's departure for Nova Scotia. The letter relates to a debt owed to Captain Hughes and Francklin's difficulties in paying it. "Mr. Mauger's... Offer of making good the Provincial Notes of Nova Scotia to the amount of Capt. Hughes Demand on Mr. Francklin... has been rejected." The letter is docketed "Capt. Edward Hughes Commanding His Majesty's Ship Sommersett."

Michael Francklin (1720-1782) was the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia from 1766 to 1773. He had been involved in mercantile ventures since 1752 in the colony and although wealthy in land ownership, was noted for being cash-poor. Joshua Mauger (1725-88) was an entrepreneur in Halifax from 1749 to 1760 and became the largest ship-owner in the Colony. Returning to England, he was appointed Nova Scotia's Agent in London in 1762. Brook Watson (1735-1807) served as a commissary with the British Army and was prominent in the expulsion of the Acadians as well as serving at Louisbourg with Wolfe. He was involved in Halifax with Francklin hence the reference in the Hughes letter. Captain Edward Hughes was the captain of the HMS Somerset in 1758 to 1762 and again in 1771 to 1774. He served at Louisbourg in 1758 and at Quebec in 1759 and retired as an admiral after amassing a fortune in prize money. An interesting manuscript from the early days of Halifax and Nova Scotia.

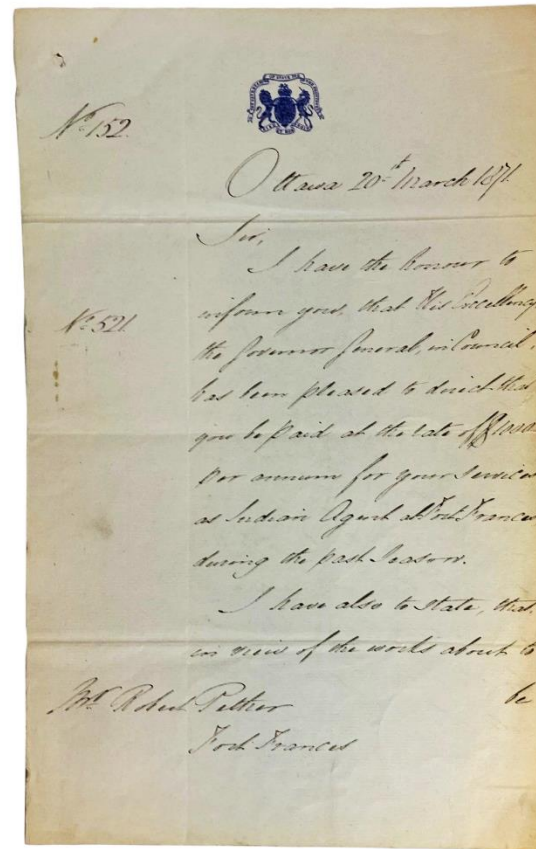
