



Four Iroquois chiefs, (the fifth died en route) were taken to London by Col. Peter Schuyler of Albany. They were presented to Queen Anne on April 19, 1710, and entertained for some months. (The Tatler, no. 171 and The Spectator, no 50), as part of Schuyler's policy to strenghten the Iroquois alliance against the French. (TPL). It provided a great deal of contemporary detail about Native American culture, specifically within the Iroquois tribe. "... and attached great observations throughout the kingdom (Spectator & Tatler) ... Dean Swift, in his letters to Stella, also makes reference to the subject ..." (Sabin). "... Portraits of these sachems (denoting the first, best, or most important in a set) engraved contemporaneously at London in folio, did not form a part of this account". (Howes).





Taking issue with the Commissioners' implications that he had used government funds in an improper manner during the war with the Colonies, Clinton here heatedly defends himself and submits documents to prove that, had his orders been read and acted upon in Britain, the so-called mismanagement of which he is now accused would not have come to pass. Also mentioned is his concern with the obvious favouring of Cornwallis by the Commissioners. The whole question of the leadership of the British troops during the Revolution, and the competition between Clinton and Cornwallis, led to its own "war" of correspondence between the two men.



Monaghan 1052. Howes M-456. Sabin 47206. JCB 3208. The author was an Italian by birth who settled in Virginia in 1773 and became a close neighbor of Thomas Jefferson. His purpose was to introduce the cultivation of the grape and the olive but, through Jefferson's influence, became active in the movement for independence and from 1779 to 1783 acted, on behalf of Patrick Henry, as agent for Virginia to obtain supplies in Italy. The work is an interesting study of the Colonies' historic ties with England and of the reasons behind the dissensions and ultimate separation. There are criticisms of similar works by Raynal and Mably, and there are chapters on slavery and on the Indians ("these people vare called savages, because their customs differ from ours, which we think the perfection of good breeding; they have the same opinion of theirs"). There are also comments on recently published works on the United States, among which he gives Jefferson's "Notes" and Jefferys' American Atlas very high marks. A most interesting work on the American Revolution and on the economic and political life in the United States at this crucial period. Both Howes and the Dictionary of American Bibliography suggest that Jefferson assisted Mazzei in this work.





taking of Senegal, Grenada, Tobago, and Dominica; the capture of Pensacola by Galvez; Cornwallis' surrender; the skirmish at St-Eustache; the siege of Fort St-Philippe in Minorca; the attack on St. Christopher; a map of the various European settlements in what became the United States; four small maps of the English concessions to France and Spain by the Treaty of 1783; the final leaf consists of a review of the Treaty of Versailles, with several small vignettes and a listing of all the plates.






Pouchot, an engineer and a soldier, was entrusted with rebuilding the defenses of Fort Niagara, where he became commandant. Although he considered the fort impregnable, he was forced to surrender to Sir William Johnson in July, 1759. After an exchange of prisoners, he was put in charge of Fort Levis where he capitulated to the superior forces of General Amherst in July, 1760. Upon his return to France, he was accused of having shared in






the corruption which led to the loss of Canada. These memoirs were written with the motive of self vindication and are an invaluable record of the War, especially of the sieges of Fort Niagara and Fort Levis. In them he discusses the corruption in the colonial administration, the morale of the French troops, as well as giving a lengthy and detailed account of the topography of Canada, of the modes of Indian warfare, and of the manners and customs of the Indians. The engraved maps include a plan of Fort Niagara and Pouchot's defences; a map of part of the St. Lawrence River showing Fort Levis and the adjacent islands with the position of Lord Amherst's flotilla; and a large map of the entire French and English frontier from Montreal to Fort Du Quesne. Unobtrusive inked annotations, probably 19th century, on the large map appear to indicate part of the campaign studied by a previously unidentified owner. They highlight the route from Lake Ontario to Montreal. Also, there are several neatly inked

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marginalia toward the end of volume II, where the battle at Fort Levis is described by Pouchot. The notes contradict Pouchot by citing references to Mante and other contemporary writers.





A rather ingenious and naive look at the country by one who was attached to Rochambeau's army, as the chaplain, during the American Revolution. This is a sentimental account of Rochambeau's aid to the Americans against the British enemy, and his contribution in assuring victory. Monaghan offers credible proof that this writer and the scholar Claude C. Robin, with whom this author is often confused, are different people, despite the cataloguing in Sabin and the BM.




First edition of this classic narrative of the French and Indian War. Rogers acted as a scout for the 1755 expedition against Crown Point, and in 1756 he became captain of an independent company of Rangers. He made scores of raids against the French in New York, Ohio, and Pennsylvania, going as far west as the shores of Lake Huron. His exploits, detailed in this book, made him the most romantic and famous figure of the war in America.

The book has served as the basis for much romantic fiction, most notably Kenneth Roberts' NORTHWEST PASSAGE. Rogers went on to briefly lead British rangers at the outset of the Revolution, raising recruits to fight against the American rebels.







His father's good friend, Peter Collinson, the English naturalist, thought William's sketches and drawings to be "elegant performances" and showed them to Dr. John Fothergill, a botanist and like William, a Quaker, who extended his patronage to the young Bartram. At Fothergill's expense Bartram spent the years 1773-1777 exploring the southeastern part of America; although he was meant to send back to Fothergill drawings, journals, seeds, specimens, etc., many of his writings and gatherings never reached England because of the war, and Bartram finally made his way back to Philadelphia in January of 1778. This work, describing the natives of the region, the plants, seeds, products, and animals, was enormously successful, and was considered "a work of high character well meriting its wide esteem." - (Howes).



The foregoing Rules and Regulations of Police have been taken into consideration by His Majesty's Court of King's Bench for the District of Montreal, during the sitting of June term, one thousand eight hundred and nine, by the said Court and approved and

RULES and REGULATIONS made by his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, at a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden at the New Sessions House, in the City of Mostreal, for the District of Montreal, on FRIDAY the TWENTY-PIERT day of APRIL, in the forty-ninth year of his Majesty's reign, and continued by adjournments to Saturday the TWENTY INSTITUTED AT the TWENTY-NINTH day of the same month, to have force and offer within the City and Suburbs of Montreal.

Art.I. [T is ordered that the restriction concerning the building of Overa in any court yard, joining to a dwelling-house, as mentioned in the 28th article of the additional Regulations of Police for the City of Montreal, made and entered of record in the Court of General Seasons of the Peace, on the 19th day of July last, be extended to Out-House; and that no Oven or Furnace wherein fire is to be put, shall be built in any court yard, joining to an out-house, in the said City or Suburbs, under the penalty in the said 28th article of the said regulations mentioned and expressed.

Art. II. All Vents of Chimnies in the said City and Suburls, all he left free and open at the top, in order that they may be sweep without impediment, and no Bars of I on shall be placed across the tops of such chimnies or otherwise, so as to prevent their being sweet, under the penalty of twenty shillings for each offence against this regulation.

Art. III. From the first day of June to the first day of December, in each year, no Carter shall be allowed to stand or remain in the Old Market Place of the said City with his horses, carts, trucks or other carriages, under the penalty of five shillings for each offence.——By the Court,



(Vlach). An official publication of the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace created in 1764 for administration of districts of Province. In 1791 there were 27 districts created in Lower Canada but in 1832 the Montreal Court was replaced by the Montreal City Council. Early publications by the Court are very scarce.


Sir: The information we have received from England, being fully corroborative of the statements generally made, as to the great number of Emigrants we may depend upon coming to this Province from all parts of the United Kingdom, we have been induced to draw up for distribution, a List of all our Lands on Sale, we beg to send you herewith a few copies, requesting that you will have a few affixed in some conspicuous places, and have the others circulated in such manners, as you may think advisable. For a like object, we enclose a particular List of the Lands of the Company situated in your District.

We think too much publicity cannot be given amongst the Farmers and others, to the fact, that numbers of Labourers seeking employment will be very considerable, and that it behoves every person in this Province to assist these individuals by every means in obtaining it, to prevent their leaving for the United States.

Excuse the trouble I am causing you, and believe me to remain,

Established in 1824, The Canada Company was a land and colonization company in Upper Canada. Frederick Widder was a Commissioner of the Company from 1839 to 1864. The District of Vittoria is located in Norfolk County, southern Ontario. Interestingly, the letter indicated the concern of the Company losing immigrants to the United States.





In Philadelphia, John Melish agreed to publish [this work]. Using Darby's statistical





account and map, which [Andrew] Jackson and members of his staff considered accurate and valuable, the publisher compiled the Melish map of the United States, which was used as the basis for boundary delineation in the treaty of 1819 between the United States and Spain. This map, which brought profit and prestige to Melish, left the explorer 'to mourn for non-requited toil and misdirected credit'. " - (DAB V. p73.). Darby finally received partial compensation in 1854. This map shows many lakes and rivers, but very few towns.







The book is an early edition of several editions published for those considering a westward move. Fremont (1813-1890) was an important figure in nineteenth-century United States, an explorer of the far west, famous in Gold Rush history, one of the first of two U.S. senators from California, and a failed Republican presidential candidate. The recipient of the letter, Charles F. Mayer (1797-1864) was the scion of an important Baltimore family, and was a lawyer and president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad. The letter is dated "Washington City, July 27, 1850", and Fremont writes: *My dear Sir, have to thank you for the attention of yours of yesterday, which I received last night. Like yourself I think that there are no objections to be entertained to Andrew Smith's Lease, and am glad that you write accordingly to Mr. Robert*



(?). I shall ask Mr. Robert to let him have it and urge him (Smith) to come out immediately to the ground. The opinion of Mr. Rose (?) will be valuable in England if he is known there, and in any case must have some weight, although it can only be upon the general subject of the validity of California, as mine in particular cannot be known to him. Permit me to remind you of Mr. Webster's opinion although it is unnecessary to do so. I write to both our friends by this mail. I hear that Stockton and Aspinwall are enthusiastic about mining in California gold. Yours truly, J. C. Fremont.


Daniel Webster was strongly in favour of acquiring as much California land as was possible and Fremont had known him since Webster was Secretary of State; Andrew Smith was an engineer and the lessee of Golden Mountain during the Gold Rush; [William Henry] Aspinwall (1807-1875) owned Howland & Aspinwall, which popularized the use of clipper ships, and founded, in I848, the Pacific Mail Steamship Company to provide service to California (very timely, indeed, since the Gold Rush began the following year !); [Robert] Stockton (1795-1866) was a naval commodore, notable in the capture of California during the Mexican-American War of 1846-1848. An interesting and very relevant letter.

The author (1765-1850) held many positions in Deerfield, Mass - surveyor, postmaster, justice of the peace, member of the Constitutional Convention of 1820, etc. He was also a major-general in the Massachusetts militia. Besides this work, he also wrote other military and genealogical treatises, and upon his death, manuscripts were found of



incomplete works pertaining to Burgoyne's campaign and various aspects of the French and Indian War. A second volume was planned but never materialized. 

Hyde worked in Toronto as a commercial artist and became interested in all forms of graphic art and especially wood engraving and fine book production. In 1946 Canadian Art 4 published an article by him on wood engraving in which he explained, "'wood engraving' as distinct from 'wood cutting' is done on the end grain of boxwood of maple. 'Wood cutting' is cut with knives on the plank side, i.e. that side of wood with the grain going in one direction only." He went on to explain each phase of development in the making of a wood engraving including the drawing of the design, transferring the design to a block, the type of tools required to do this work, taking the print, and a list of books for further information to the serious student. Accompanying this article were four of his outstanding engravings to illustrate the tools and their results. In 1951 he created Southern Crosss a fictional story of a south sea island and what happened to it after the Bikini A-bomb tests. He did extensive research for the novel to make it as authentic as possible and completely independent of the






need for a text. The book was produced by The Ward Ritchie Press of Los Angeles, California, U.S.A. Each book was printed directly from the artist's own wood engravings. He had to import the 'hard to get' boxwood from Turkey by way of a firm in London, England. This type of boxwood is harder than most and is close-grained which insures a lasting engraving. American artist Rockwell Kent said of his work "Laurence Hyde is a master of the difficult and infinitely laborious art of wood engraving." In 1952 his wood engravings for card designs appeared in Paul Duval's Canadian Drawings and Prints and were noted by him as follows, "The wood-engravings by Laurence Hyde have some



Le Clercq was a Recollet priest who spent a great deal of time in what are now Quebec and New Brunswick. Of great importance also are the examples of the Micmac language. Given the fact that he spent about twelve years with the Micmacs, knew their language, had day-to-day contact with them, and was held in high esteem by them, his Relation is one of the most reliable guides to Indian life and one of the best-written and most reliable sources of information relating to the formative years of New France.








produce of Flemish and English farmers, Lord Dalhousie remarks as follows: It is not the bleak mountains of Scotland that have progressed so much beyond the Agriculture of England, but the rich Lowlands south of the mountains. On the contrary the System of fallowing is the Scottish practice and is readily exploited in England. - to Sir John Sinclair the above comparative table is not very explicit and there appears to be in it some Flemish crop errors not -redley(?)...

'The Plough Boy", a pioneer American agricultural weekly magazine published in Albany, first appeared in June 1819. The editor originally listed as Henry Homespun, Jr. was the pseudonym for Solomon Southwick (1773-1839), whose name appeared in the magazine title in Volume 1, number 34 with the added title, "The Plough Boy and Journal of the Board of Agriculture". The periodical had been selected as the official journal of the Board of Agriculture for the State of New York. A very popular periodical, it was printed for over twenty years.

Philemon Wright (1760-1839) created the first permanent settlement in the Ottawa Valley region in 1800 on the north side of the Ottawa River. It became a primarily agricultural community covering what is now the city of Gatineau and Aylmer. At about 37,000 acres it became the most developed farming area in Lower Canada. Farms included Gateno, Columbia Falls, Columbia, Britannia, Chaudiere and Dalhousie Farm. Wright shared an interest with Lord Dalhousie in the development and improvement of agriculture in Canada. Certainly a library of agricultural books would





George Ramsay, 9th Earl of Dalhousie, was recognized as having an ardent interest in agricultural improvement and was noted as inspiring the formation of agricultural societies throughout the Colonies. He obviously had studied "The Plough Boy" and on page 381 of Volume I, as noted above. In Nova Scotia, Lord Dalhousie was a friend and supporter of Scottish agricultural writer, John Young, who dedicated his book, on improving Canadian agriculture, "Letters of Agricola" (Halifax, 1822) to the Governor-General.


Dr. B.R. MacKay, had a long career at the Geological Survey, (1907-1953). He was a valued member of the Ottawa Historical Society and was known for leading the campaign to save historical buildings or sites. He had so many books in his large house it began to sink under the weight. He donated many articles to the Bytown museum and claimed among his prizes the present set of books, a rope that Wright had used to tie his first timber raft, etc. He also had Sir John A. Macdonald's desk, and carried a picture showing the desk in J.A.'s library. He had a great passion for his books, for Canadiana especially concerning early Ottawa.

The Report was made under the Inspector General's Office, Toronto signed W. Cayley, Inspector General. William Cayley (1807-1890) was Inspector General of Canada from 1854 to 1858. He was elected to the Legislative Assembly of Canada variously for Huron, Bruce and Renfrew and as a member of the "Family Compact" faded out of public office with passing of the group's influence.
