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

In 1893 Lord Aberdeen became Governor General of Canada and he and Lady Aberdeen traveled extensively in Canada. Her journal is an important source of insight into the problems and times in the country during the 1890's. The appendix contains a biographical dictionary of principal persons and lists the members of the household.


Far more important, however, was her work with women's organizations. A staunch Presbyterian and Gladstonian Liberal, a woman of great poise and boundless energy, she was an aristocrat-democrat with a strong social conscience. She believed that women represented an enormous, unused capacity in Canada, and that they would be a civilizing force in an untamed country. She was instrumental in forming the Canadian branch of the National Council of Women. Despite fierce opposition from the medical establishment, she created the Victorian Order of Nurses. The social family compact in Ottawa, Montréal and Toronto opposed and ridiculed her projects. Her attempts to use Rideau Hall to cool the racial and religious passions of the 1890s and to break down social barriers did not endear her to the local establishment. -John Saywell "EncycCan"







His narrative relates the voyage by Baffin Bay, Lancaster Sound, and Barrow Strait, and the party's wintering at Griffiths Island. He provides details on the West Greenland Esquimaux, ice and weather conditions, sledge journeys. Osborn explored the west coast of Prince of Wales Island in the spring sledge journeys of 1851, and on the return journey, sailed a considerable distance to Jones Sound.

Immediately after his appointment as Governor-in-Chief of the Hudson's Bay Company, locum Tenens, 1820, George Simpson travelled from Montreal following the old fur trade route to Fort William, and then to the Athabaska region, to control hostilities between the Hudson's Bay Company and the North West Company. From Rock Depot, Manitoba, he moved to Athabaska and organized an amalgamation in 1821. The journal in which his historic trip was reported to the Company appears in the handwriting of Simpson's clerk, Robert Seaborn Miles.







Bartlett was an accomplished artist of the English landscape school of his day. He met the taste of his time by combining topographical sketches with a romantic mood. The two volumes include many remarkably dramatic sketches: a storm








sweeping over the timber rafts on Lake St. Peter; the awesome rapids on approach to the village of Cedars; or a distant view of the lake beneath Owl's Head Mountain in the Eastern Townships. He was equally adept in creating the mood of vast tranquillity in a popularized Turne esque manner. Tremendous landscapes, often in a setting sun, met this taste, as when he drew Lily Lake at Saint John, or a scene on the St. Lawrence near Montreal. From the historical point of view his work is both interesting and valuable... There is an endless charm to seeing Ottawa (then Bytown) as nothing more than Col. By's Canal with a few houses on the hill, or the Montreal water front with its sailing ships, or the view from Mount Royal, showing the broad farmlands between the mountain and the city.





Consists of two essays read by the author before the American Philosophical Society on American Revolution paper currency. An Appendix lists all the issues and denominations of all the bills of credit issued by Congress. Samuel Breck (1771-1862) was born in Boston and educated there and in France. He was a major figure in the mercantile, philanthropic, and political life of Philadelphia during the first half of the nineteenth century. With an interest in historical and literary affairs, Breck was an active member of the Library Company of Philadelphia, the Philadelphia Athenaeum, the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, and the American Philosophical Society (elected 1838).




This volume includes 33 Reports, published in facsimile, relating to Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia, and the Upper and Lower Canadas. Subjects include: the formation of the Canada Company; land grants; the church and Clergy Reserves; populations and emigration; post offices; colonial government; water communications; crown revenues; and imports & exports (Newfoundland). Canal building was active during this period and a number of the Reports deal with this including detailed maps: the Shuben-Acadie, the Rideau and Carillon Canal canals and proposals for the Welland Canal. The Reports are unabridged and printed in their entirety. The editors have included a continuous pagination for ease of reference.





Howes C215; Lande 108; Sabin 11184; JCB 2538; TPL 415; COX 11. This edition contains the two leaves of "Address to the Public" and a plate of the Tobacco plant, neither found in the first edition. "The second edition is by far the rarest of the three London editions" (Stevens, Rare Americana, 1927). After serving in five campaigns against the French in Canada, and narrowly escaping massacre while commanding a company at Fort William Henry, Jonathan Carver determined to explore beyond the Mississippi, and to find an overland route to the Pacific Ocean. Starting from Boston, in June 1766, he travelled 1300 miles to the most remote British post, and surveyed the bays and rivers of Lake Superior. Then, with supplies for trade with the Indians, he struck north-west of the Mississippi area, further than any explorer had been except Hennepin in 1680 and later proceeded west to the sources of



the St. Pierre, or Minnesota, River, living among the Indians and learning their language. He returned to Boston in October 1768, having visited 12 Indian nations and travelled some seven thousand miles. Carver's work is particularly rich in Indian lore and the methods of Indian warfare are described in detail. The book is also of value as a record of early travels in Minnesota and French Canada, and contains one of the earliest descriptions of the regions. Carver left Boston for Fort Michilimakinac, via Lake Superior.



It refers to the capture of Quebec and the death of Wolfe, and urges that the British Government in making peace with France demand the cession of the whole of Canada. (Lande). An appeal to William Pitt and the Duke of Newcastle that the process of making peace with France must include France's relinquishing all of Canada, Guadeloupe, and Senegal. The issue is important for having elicited Franklin's noteworthy the Interest of Great Britain Considered with Regard to Her Colonies.











"he was coloured by the narrow range of his experience & his contacts with only the well-to-do, and was bitterly critical of the Methodists, as was William Dunlop. "Sweeping disparagement of a republic whose citizens were neither gentlemen nor scholars" -Howes. He fled to Canada when he found the United States not to be of his liking. He offers his opinions on emigrations (advocating Canada over the United States), on religion, the cholera, etc. etc.,



Kane was inspired by George Catlin, whom he met during a visit to Europe. He decided to sketch and paint a series of pictures illustrative of North American Indians and scenery. He traversed, often alone, the territories of the Red River Settlement, the Valley of the Saskatchewan, across the Rocky Mountains, down the Columbia River, along the shores of Puget Sound, and through regions of Vancouver Island. He returned with hundreds of detailed sketches resulting in hundreds of paintings.




