



The first volume deals with the sea voyage of the Polar Star, the second with Umberto Cagni's sledging journey towards the North Pole". Stam & Stam 4.11. - With helpful information provided by Fridtjof Nansen, they reach the then Farthest North, 86o 34'N on April 24, twenty-one nautical miles closer to the Pole than Nansen's record of 1895.



Chappe d'Auteroche (1728-1769) was a French priest and astronomer who travelled to Siberia to observe the Transit of Venus in 1761; this work is the result of that trip, the first part of Volume I being a fascinating account of fauna, flora, manners and customs, meteorological observations, climate, iron ore, gold mines, ete., and the second a meticulous compilation of results of the scientific experiments and observations recorded. Volume II is devoted to the author's translation of Krasheninnikov's "Kamchatka; " although a French translation had been previously published, it had been based on the abridged English translation of I 764 and Chappe d'Auteroche decided to return to the original Russian edition for this excellent translation. "This work deserves





attention for its splendid and accurate engravings" (Hill), many of which are by Le Prince, Moreau le jeune, Caresme de Fécamp, etc and engraved by the likes of Tilliard, Duclos, de Launay, Saint-Aubin, inter alia.


Between January and August, 1761-62, the French astronomer travels to Tobolsk, Siberia, by way of St. Petersburg and observes the transit of Venus over the sun. His account provides a mass of detail on drinking, science, mercantile exports, religion, etc. His criticisms provoked a rebuttal, written "By a Lover of Truth", The Antidote: or an enquiry into the merits of a book entitled, A journey into Siberia... in which many essential errors and misrepresentations are pointed out and confuted. 


The Expedition of 1875-76. Voyage of the "Alert" & "Discovery" commanded by Captain Nares was an attempt to reach the North Pole. Most of the illustrations are placed in Greenland in the first year. Over wintering, the Expedition carried out significant sledging operations. The Expedition of 1876: Voyage of the yacht "Pandora" commanded by Sir Allen Young was an attempt to find the North West Passage via the Franklin Channel.

Not located in T PL nor in Peel. The term "Indian Territories" was first used in the Quebec Act of 1774, in reference to the region of northwest America outside of the boundaries of the Province of Quebec and the Hudson's Bay Company (HBC) territory of Rupert's Land. The said regions did not fall within the jurisdiction recognized by the Quebec courts, but were loosely under the watchful eye of the British. In the years that followed the American Revolutionary War, the fur trade based out of Montreal experienced a resurgence under the aegis of a handful of entrepreneurial merchants. Some were Empire Loyalists, others Scottish merchants, and still others British adventurers. Competition was fierce, and some of these men united to form the North West Company (NWC) in 1779. Violence grew, murders and destruction of property became common, and it became obvious that the criminal and civil legal jurisdiction of the Indian Territories needed to be defined in order to regulate the fur traders. This act, the Canada Jurisdiction Act, stipulated that those British subjects who committed offenses in the Indian Territories could be tried and sentenced in Lower Canada or in Upper Canada in the same manner as if the crimes were committed in either of the provinces. It also authorised the governor to appoint Justices of the Peace within the Indian Territories. Thus this Act became the fundamental instrument for dispute resolution between the HBC and the NWC.






Detailed engraving depicts Hudson Bay and Detroit de Hudson as well as 'Labrador nomme anciennement par les Francois Nouve. Bretagne', and all of James Bay of Whose east coast, depicted notionally, it is said, 'Toute cette Coste n'est presque pas connu.' Various Hudson Bay forts and posts located along the Western shores of James and Hudson Bay are identified, some with both their English and French names (to accommodate variable residents) as are several major tributaries. However, the most common identifier is 'inconnue'-- as in the case of the region southwest of Hudson Bay of which it is said, 'Etendue de Pays entierement Inconnue'. Likely from Prevost's multi-volume Histoire Generale des Voyages, (1746-1757) for which Bellin prepared maps as 'Ingr. de la Marine'.

Immediately after his appointment as Governor-in-Chief of the Hudson's Bay Company, locum Tenens, 1820, George Simpson travelled from Montreal following the old fur trade route to Fort William, and then to the Athabaska region, to control hostilities between the Hudson's Bay Company and the North West Company. From Rock Depot, Manitoba, he moved to Athabaska and organized an amalgamation in 1821. The journal in which his historic trip was reported to the Company appears in the hand-writing of Simpson's clerk, Robert Seaborn Miles.



Caron de Beaumarchais (1732-1799) was a playwright, watchmaker and adventurer, whose best-known works are "The Marriage of Figaro" and "The Barber of Seville". At the behest of Joseph Duverney, financier and advisor to Mme de Pompadour, he was sent on several missions to England and to Spain to try to secure a monopoly on the slave trade; although unsuccessful he managed, through other undertakings, to become financially secure enough to purchase the post of "King's Secretary". Beaumarchais was already surreptitiously supplying arms to the American colonies when France came into the war officially in 1778 on the side of the Americans. He now organized a fleet of merchant ships whose purpose was to supply cannon and ammunition to the Continental Congress in exchange for produce, especially tobacco. Forty years later his daughter was still waiting for compensation, said to be approximately twenty million francs. As a supporter of the French Revolution, Beaumarchais' position at the Court was suspect; he spent some time in prison and then fled to England and thence to the Continent; his Paris property was confiscated. He returned to Paris in 1796, but died in relative poverty in 1799. This work was written in response to an earlier work by Edward Gibbon, concerning the assistance given by France to the Americans during the Revolutionary War, and is "a recital of French and U.S. grievances against Great Britain and a justification of French policy." - (Etcheverria & Wilkie).



John Douglas Borthwick (1832-1912), author and Anglican clergyman, served in Montreal most of his life and was sometime Protestant chaplain of Montreal prison. Although earlier on he wrote several reference books, he is remembered as a historian of Montreal and for his many books on the city.


Lett, William Pittman (1819-1892), journalist and poet, was born in County Wexford, Ireland, in 1819, the son of Capt. Andrews Lett, of the 26th Cameronian Highlanders. He was brought to Canada in 1820, and he was one of the earliest inhabitants of Ottawa (then Bytown). From 1855 to his death on August 15, 1892, he was city clerk of Ottawa. He was the author of Recollections of Bytown and its oldest inhabitants (Ottawa, 1874) in verse; and The city of Ottawa and its surroundings (Ottawa, 1884) and Annexation and British connection (Ottawa, 1889) in prose. - Wallace. The History of Emily Montague was the first novel set and written in Canada. Frances Brooke lived in Sillery, Quebec, where her husband was garrison chaplain, from 1763 to 1768. The novel provides a vivid description of the Quebec scenery and manners of the time and is particularly notable for its sympathetic portrayal of the Canadian First Nations, contemporary views on the agricultural potential of Canada, on the French Canadians. It provides a good description of the life and amusements of a garrison-based society. During the following decades, the work substituted as a guidebook for visitors to Quebec.





The History of Montague, the first Canadian novel, was written by Frances Brooke, wife of the first clergyman of the Church of England in Quebec. In 1763 Mrs. Brooke became one of the most vivacious members of the little society in Quebec. This exclusive group included Governor Murray, Hector Theophilus Cramahé of the Executive Council, Henry Caldwell, who had served under Wolfe and who later became the Receiver General for the Colony, Adam Mabane, a cousin of James Thomson author of The Seasons and of Rule Britannia, and himself judge of the first civil court held in Quebec. Mrs. Brooke was apparently also on friendly terms with those members of the French nobility who had remained in Canada after its cession to England. The History of Emily Montague was published in 1769. Whether or not the novel was actually written in Canada is impossible to say; it seems more than likely, however, that many of the notes upon which the story is based were written in this country. In her book, Frances Brooke writes: "The Canadians live a good deal like the ancient patriarchs; the lands were originally settled by the troops, every officer became a seigneur, or lord of the manor, every soldier took lands under his commander; but, as avarice is natural to mankind, the soldiers took a great deal more than they could cultivate, by way of providing for a family; which is the reason so much land is now waste in the finest part of the province; those who had children, and in general they have a great number, portioned out their lands amongst them as they married, and lived in the midst of a 'little world of their descendants." Here is what one of her male characters has to say about French Canadian women: "I have been making some flying visits to the French ladies; tho' I have not seen many beauties, yet

in general the women are handsome; their manner is easy and obliging, they make the most of their charms by their vivacity, and I certainly cannot be displeased with their extreme partiality for the English officers . . . . I am every day more pleased with the women here; and, if I was gallant, should be in danger of being a convert to the French stile of gallantry; which certainly clebases the mind much less than ours." The opinion of an Englishwoman: "The French ladies are handsome, but as to the beaux, they appear to me not at all dangerous, and one might safely walk in a wood by moonlight with the most agreeable Frenchman here. I am not surprised the Canadian ladies take such pains to seduce our men from us; but I think it a little hard we have no temptation to make reprisals." Mrs. Brooke's circle in London included Dr. Samuel Johnson, as the following excerpt from a note in Mrs. Brooke's hand.

The Province of Canada (or the United Province of Canada or the United Canadas) was a British colony in North America from 1841 to 1867. Its formation reflected recommendations made by John Lambton, 1st Earl of Durham, in the Report on the Affairs of British North America following the Rebellions of 1837–1838.

The Act of Union 1840, passed on 23 July 1840 by the British Parliament and proclaimed by the Crown on 10 February 1841,[1] merged the Colonies of Upper Canada and Lower Canada by abolishing their separate parliaments and replacing them with a single one with two houses, a Legislative Council as the upper chamber and the Legislative Assembly as the lower chamber. In the aftermath of the Rebellions of 1837–1838, unification of the two Canadas was driven by two factors. Firstly, Upper Canada was near bankruptcy because it lacked stable tax revenues, and needed the resources of the more populous Lower Canada to fund its internal transportation improvements. Secondly, unification was an attempt to swamp the French vote by giving each of the former provinces the same number of parliamentary seats, despite the larger population of Lower Canada.


Although Durham's report had called for the Union of the Canadas and for responsible government (a government

accountable to an independent local legislature), only the first of the two recommendations was implemented in 1841. For the first seven years, the government was led by an appointed governor general accountable only to the British Crown and the Queen's ministers. Responsible government was not achieved until the second LaFontaine—Baldwin ministry in 1849, when Governor General James Bruce, 8th Earl of Elgin, agreed to request a cabinet be formed on the basis of the largest party in the Legislative Assembly, effectively making the premier the head of the government and reducing the governor general to a more symbolic role.

The Province of Canada ceased to exist at Canadian Confederation on 1 July 1867, when it was divided into the Canadian provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Ontario included the area occupied by the pre-1841 British colony of Upper Canada, while Quebec included the area occupied by the pre-1841 British colony of Lower Canada (which had included Labrador until 1809, when Labrador was transferred to the British colony of Newfoundland).[2] Upper Canada was primarily English-speaking, whereas Lower Canada was primarily French-speaking.





"describing the terrible disasters which befell the expedition from the attacks of the hostile Indians, and the author's subsequent captivity in Mexican prisons" - (Sabin) The Texan Santa Fe Expedition was both a commercial and a political endeavor, initiated by Mirabeau Lamar, President of the Republic of Texas, who was anxious to bring the Santa Fe region under his hegemony, as well as the profitable Trail. The party of volunteers which was sent out in June, 1841 was accompanied by an army that was led by Col. Hugh McLeod. The Texans were quite unprepared for the scope of the exercise - their supplies were inadequate, their plans were poorly formulated, and they had not expected the Indian attacks visited upon them. In the end they were captured, marched to Mexico City, and imprisoned there. They were not released until April, 1842.



This great map is considered the "parent plan" of one of the most important series of maps of North America. It was drawn and issued by William Faden, the leading British cartographer at the time of the American Revolution. The map is a detailed view of the colonies and illustrates the British view of their possessions at an early point in the rebellion. The Province of Quebec is shown per the Quebec Act of 1774 with its boundary on the Ohio River. The title cartouche is finely engraved with the title inscribed onto the side of a hill. A fishing net is strung between trees to represent that important industry. In the foreground merchants and workman symbolize trade and commerce and a settlement with sailing ships is seen in the background. After the Revolution, Faden changed the title of this map to read, "United States of North America," and it was regularly updated by him and later publishers until nearly the middle of the nineteenth century.



When there was a threat of England 's being invaded by France in 1756 during the Seven Years' War, Sir John Mordaunt was entrusted with the command of an expedition against Rochefort: the naval portion was under the command of Admiral Sir Edward Hawke. Among others under Mordaunt was young James Wolfe, as quartermaster-general. Because of delays, bad weather and indecisiveness, it was decided not to run the risk of an attack and the expedition, which had cost\_over\_a million pounds sterling, returned home. A court of inquiry was ordered, of which this is the report, and a subsequent court-martial found Mordaunt not guilty.



BARNABD, Edward (1717-1781), provost of Eton, born in 1717, was the son of a Bedfordshire clergyman. He was on the foundation at Eton, but, becoming superannuated, entered at St. John's College, Cambridge, where he became B.A. 1738, M.A. 1742, B.D. 1750 and D.D. 1756. He was fellow of his college from March 1743-4 to 1756. In 1752 he was at Eton as tutor to Henry Townshend, brother to Lord Sydney, and he became also tutor' to George Hardinge, afterwards Welsh justice, Whose recollections of Barnard are given at length in Nichols's 'Anecdotes' (viii. 543). Barnard succeeded Sumner as head master of Eton in 1754, and raised the numbers of the school from three hundred to five hundred. He received a canonry of Windsor in 1761, and in 1764 became provost of Eton. He was also rector of St. Pau1's Cray, Kent. He died 2 Dec. 1801. A tablet to his memory, with an inscription, is in Eton College chapel. Barnard, according to Hardinge, was a man of coarse features and clumsy figure, but with a humour and vivacity which, but for his physical disadvantages, would have made him the equal of Garrick; and he ruled his boys chiefly by force of ridicule. Upon Barnard's death Johnson, according to Mrs. Piozzi, pronounced a long eulogium upon his wit, learning, and goodness, and added: 'He was the only man


that did justice to my good breeding, and you may observe that I am well bred to a needless degree of \*scrupulosity.' He is not to be confounded with Thomas Barnard, the bishop of Killaloe and Limerick [q. v.], who was also a friend of Johnson.(\*Scrupulosity is a psychological disorder primarily characterized by pathological guilt or obsession associated with moral or religious issues that is often accompanied by compulsive moral or religious observance and is highly distressing and maladaptive) and Eulogium, a formal expression of praise for someone who has died recently).

Spencer published his travels in large part to wake up the British public to the threat posed by the Russian Empire upon the regions he traversed. He includes many details on the people and their cultures, as well as relating his actual journey.





Tooley 473. Handley Cross first appeared in monthly parts in The New Sporting Magazine between March 1838 and August 1839. "Originally published in 3 vols., octavo, in 1843, unillustrated, then in 17 monthly parts from March 1853 and October 1854 [illustrated], and on completion in volume form " - Tooley. This edition is the 3rd issue of the first complete illustrated edition. Robert Smith Surtees came from a family of landowners who were passionate about hunting. Surtees began a career as a lawyer, but also wrote articles for The Sporting Magazine. He founded his own periodical, The New Sporting Magazine, and contributed stories that led to his series of novels. Surtees unexpectedly inherited his family estate and afterwards devoted his time to writing and hunting. He published six novels from 1838 and 1864, all centered around the country activities of the comic character Jorrocks. "Mr. Jorrocks vies with Pickwick for the honour of being the most delightful and popular character in English fiction." - Schwerdt II, 233. Surtees' books were illustrated by the caricaturist John Leech (1817-1864), who also produced cartoons for Punch.




