




Cooke p299. A.B. 402. Narrative of the first expedition to navigate the Northwest Passage in a single vessel, the expedition that brought Amundsen to prominence as a polar explorer. In 1901 he gave up the idea of medicine and decided to become an explorer. After several months in Hamburg studying the science of terrestrial magnetism, he purchased an old ship, the Gjoa, 70ft long and thirty years old. He put in a 14 hp engine; then, with six dogs and enough provisions on board, he got underway with a crew of six on 17 June, 1903. His aim was to find the North-West Passage which had been sought in vain since the time of John Cabot. In September, he crossed Peel Sound and anchored in a sheltered bay on King William Island. Eskimos came up to him who knew of the existence of white men by oral tradition only. Seventy-two years earlier, James Ross, had sailed in these regions with Parry. Amundsen bought tooth and bone necklaces and clothes which later enriched the Oslo museum. He also spent two winters learning about the Eskimo way of life. In Oct. 1905, he set out again for the North-West Passage. On August 30th the Gjoa entered the Nome roadstead. For the first time in world history a ship sailing north of America had found a way from the Atlantic to the Pacific.



Field 63. - Back, who had been on both Franklin expeditions, was sent out to locate Ross, who had been unreported through three winters. News of Ross's safe return reached Back in April 1833 and he then pursued the expedition's secondary objectives. These were, firstly, to navigate the length of a river supposedly arising in the neighbourhood of the Great Slave Lake and running north to the Arctic Sea, and then, secondly, to map as much as possible of




the sea-coast. He was successful in both objectives, travelling 7,500 miles in total and traversing the full 440-mile length of the river (known as Thlueetessy' by the First Nations). The Great Fish River, as Back named it, has since become known as The Back River. Back discusses in some detail the dealings with the Indian tribes he met along the way, and their dependency upon these natives, especially during the winter. "A fundamental source of information about Indian life along the route of the Arctic expedition." - (Streeter) It was on this expedition of 7,500 miles that Back discovered and named Montreal Island, after the city which had given him such a tumultuous farewell.





The so-called "cheap edition" of this Klondike Gold Rush guidebook, also published as The Routes and Mineral Resources of North Western Canada (1898). Dyer, the Honorary Secretary of the Incorporated London Chamber of Mines, describes not only the principal means of reaching the Upper Yukon Country, but also "the resources, chief waterways, routes and distances around and throughout the far Northern Dominion, and more particularly of the Yukon-Mackenzie Country and the means of access to that region." Includes a wealth of information on the would-be prospectors, from dog-trains and reindeer transport to Klondike market prices in July 1897. Octavo. Original yellow cloth binding, with black titles. 




Ellis served as hydrographer, surveyor & mineralogist on the expedition under Capt. William Moor sent to discover the Northwest passage in 1746. The expedition proved decisively that no such passage from Hudson's Bay existed & contributed to a lapse of British interest in the subject until 1816. Ellis' work provided interesting & valuable information about the customs of the then relatively unknown Esquimaux, observations on the tides, and the 'vagaries of the compass'. Plates depict natural history subjects, Eskimo costume & customs, and views.







"Ellis went as proprietors' agent and scientific specialist with a two ship expedition commissioned to find the Northwest Passage, a hundred years after James' conclusion that such a search was pointless. Ellis' descriptions aroused James Isham to a hostile response, not published until much later (1949)". Waterston p9.


Ellis lost favour with Sir Joseph Banks and the Admiralty by publishing this account of Cook's last voyage two years before the official version appeared. His title of "assistant surgeon" seems to have been an invention (NMM); his actual rank was surgeon's mate, and he assumed the duties as naturalist after the death of Anderson. His account is valuable particularly for the fine engraved plates, "among the earliest published on the Hawaiian Islands, Alaska, and the North-West" (Hill). A German translation of this work quickly appeared in 1783. Lacking advancement in England, Ellis was about to undertake an expedition for Sweden when he was killed in an accident in 1785. - Sources: Du Rietz, Hill, Lada, NMM, Strathern.









When relief ships failed to reach the expedition all but seven died of starvation in the attempt to walk to safety. Included are accounts of sea ice, sledge journeys, camp life, the arduous march, and the geography of the area explored. One of the first U.S. expeditions and one of the most tragic.



Austin in 1850-1851. His narrative relates the voyage by Baffin Bay, Lancaster Sound, and Barrow Strait, and the party's wintering at Griffith's Island. He provides details on the West Greenland Esquimaux, ice and weather conditions, sledge journeys. Osborn explored the west coast of Prince of Wales Island in the spring of 1851 by sledge and on his return journey, sailed a considerable distance into Jones Sound.



It resulted in the discovery of King William Sound and the extensive survey of Boothia Peninsula, and the discovery of the magnetic pole by James Clark Ross. The dietary importance of fresh meat and oil in the particular climate was first ascertained on this voyage so that all but three men survived four winters and the loss of the Victory.



Georg Wilhelm Steller was born in Germany and educated at Wittenberg as a physician, he accompanied wounded troops to their Russian homeland in I 734 and there met the naturalist and geographer Daniel Gottlieb Messerschmidt (1685-1735). Messerschmidt had been contracted by Russian Emperor






Peter the Great to gather medicinal plants and other floral species in Siberia. Over a seven-year excursion, he collected many rare specimens, including the first mammoth fossil remains, and kept a detailed diary of his bindings. When Messerschmidt died and Steller married his widow, Steller had access to these notes, piquing his interest in exploration. He had the opportunity to join Vitus Bering's second expedition to Kamchatka in 1740, as a scientist and physician. He spent the winter in Kamchatka, and then Bering asked him to accompany him to further investigate the strait between the islands. After the ship went of course in a storm and landed at Kayak Island, Alaska in 1741, Steller explored the terrain, thus being the first European on Alaskan soil.

This work contains his detailed observations of Kamchatka and the Alaskan coast in the 18th century: the geography of the land, including the minerals and fossils; the marine birds and animals, and the insects, flora and fauna, many of which were new to him. He also discusses the native Itelmen and their social life, customs and dress; as well as their means of settling disputes, and the possibilities for future trade with them. Baron Joseph von Lassberg (1770-1855) was in the service of Prince von Furstenberg as chief warden of forests before retiring to his estate at Eppishausen. He collected more than 12,000 books and 273 valuable manuscripts for his library, which he eventually sold to the Fiirstlich Fiirtenbergischen Hofbibliothek at Donaueschingen, Germany.

commanding a company at Fort William Henry, Jonathan Carver determined to explore beyond the Mississippi, and to find an overland route to the Pacific Ocean. Starting from Boston, in June 1766, he travelled 1300 miles to the most remote British post, and surveyed the bays and rivers of Lake Superior. Then, with supplies for trade with the Indians, he struck north-west of the Mississippi area, further than any explorer had been except Hennepin in 1680 and later proceeded west to





the sources of the St. Pierre, or Minnesota, River, living among the Indians and learning their language. He returned to Boston in October 1768, having visited 12 Indian nations and travelled some seven thousand miles. Carver's work is particularly rich in Indian lore and the methods of Indian warfare are described in detail. The book is also of value as a record of early travels in Minnesota and French Canada, and contains one of the earliest descriptions of the regions. It attracted considerable attention because of its description of places supposedly lying near the North-West Passage. Carver's compelling narrative was hugely popular and was re-issued in over twenty editions; including a third revised edition by 1791.



The Treaty of Versailles was the peace agreement between the Allied Countries and Germany to mark the end of World War I. The armistice was signed on November 11th, 1918, though negotiations lasted for many months afterwards. 





He was successively a teacher and a journalist, founding the radical "London Sun" in 1831. He travelled extensively throughout Upper and Lower Canada, and was only 23 when he wrote this work which was published in London. He describes the life in Upper Canada at the time, and gives a detailed account of the flora and fauna, climate, society, education, emigration, manners and Indians, of the Lower Canadians. Talbot's account was written with a view to giving a more realistic appraisal of the prospects and difficulties for immigrants than he felt was afforded by a number of contemporary works.

"Edward Allen Talbot, a young Irishman, described the trip taken by his family up the St. Lawrence in search of a new life, replacing the discouragement of impoverished gentility in Ireland. Lively impression of Montreal, Kingston, York and the London region are capped by

But the book was written to warn potential emigrants of the danger of trusting agents' accounts of the new country, and to show the "semi-barbarism" of life in the settlements.
